

Petition for Friday Night Opening By-Law Snared in Legal Blocks

Grade 'A' water. A more thorough analysis is to be made hereon. Permission for the ball club to erect a double height of snow fence at the rear of the ball diamond to stop lake-bound balls was given, also permission to the I.O. D.E. to hold tag days on Fall Fair dates this September.

When the work sheets were reviewed, deputy-reeve E. Footitt called attention to stop signs needed at Maria and at Wilbur Sts., also a dead tree on Church St. Councillor L. Wick also remarked on two dead trees on Park Ave. and Councillor Newton noted a rotten tree on Frederick St.

Councillor Lindsay's mention of a Church St. drain started a talk on the need to standardize steel catch basin tops over the town.

Councillor E. Brunelle inquired when the giling would start. The contractor for this work is to be contacted and a time pinned down. Reeve Hargrave passed on a request from a Bower Ave. resident that trees in front of her house be trimmed and the sidewalk fixed.

When complaints about the dust at the park again came up, an idea from Councillor Lindsay that the track be fenced off entirely and sodded over got some excited discussion. Council decided to look over the track, seldom used now, before taking action.

Council approved an application for relief, also endorsed a motion from the town of New Toronto petitioning for more Ontario government facilities to take care of retarded children. A restricting proposal from the Electrical Contractors' Association, amounting to a "closed shop" aim, was not endorsed.

By-laws in various stages of passage consumed over an hour of council time.

Service Extension By-Laws The county equalized assessment by-law for 1955 was accepted. A by-law authorizing a \$13,300 watermain extension debenture was passed, as was a by-law to permit borrowing on a \$10,000 sewer extension debenture.

Associates were appointed town engineers for the Lakeview subdivision by-law.

Two other by-laws, one to authorize sewer extension construction in an area of the Glenlea subdivision and another to close part of Aages St. and convey the lands to Beardmore Co. Ltd., were also passed.

A tender from an Acton citizen for the future public school land cost debenture was read. The clerk was asked to acknowledge the tender.

Councillor Lindsay asked that a letter from council be sent to Stan Hall, M.P.P., urging Fairy Lake be restocked as soon as possible. Councillor Newton advised that a hydrant on Cobble Hill is dead. He asked that some work be done on it to improve the Cemetery Hill sidewalk.

Need Cement Mixer Councillor A. Irwin raised some questions about overtime pay and holidays for A. Duby, town waterworks employee, presently serving visiting service extensions for council.

Reeve Hargrave reported a Peel St. resident is anxious that a drainage problem be alleviated in front of his home; also observed that Wallace St., at the highway, should have some work done on it to eliminate pot-holes.

Mayor Tyler asked that the sewer committee investigate the purchase of a cement mixer for town use.

Proof that an equal share of the breaks was forthcoming for Acton Intermediates was supplied this week in activity in the Halton county circuit when the youthful locals won two of their last three games.

Spearheaded by the brilliant two hit pitching of southpaw Harry Lawson, the Acton club took a 3-1 decision from Oakville Snobs under the arc lights last Friday in Oakville, and last night (Wednesday) they downed Waterdown to the tune of 13-4 at the local ball yard.

One decision was lost—a 10-2 verdict to Milton Red Sox in the county town last Saturday.

Friday night's win was achieved at the expense of two Oakville hurlers, Carrick and Banks, whose offerings were pounded for seven hits. The Acton crew scored one in the top half of the third when Harold Townsley got on and scored, and added two more in the fifth to rack up the winning margin.

Lawson, hurling from the fork side of the slab for the locals, was a puzzle for the Snobs and they managed only two hits from his slants. It was Lawson's second pitching assignment this season and strong fielding support gave him plenty of confidence. Oakville's only run was scored in the last half of the sixth.

Snyder Startles At Acton last night the Acton club shelled Fawcett, Waterdown's ace left hander from the hill in the fourth inning and gave "Fat" Finnamore, his successor, a rough night of it as well. Waterdown, meanwhile, had to face a hook artist in Sam Snyder pitching his second game this season and they found Sam had lost little of his curve-drop magic. Snyder had a neat three nitter going until the fifth when the

Acton added three more in the third with Lawson starting it off again by being hit by the pitcher, stealing second as Bruce rapped a single over third base. Morton walked to fill the bases. McCrystall whiffed but Townsley rapped a fly ball deep into right scoring all three runners. Unfortunately, Harold had to stay at first when he overran the bag.

The visitors remained scoreless in the fourth while Acton added four more for a 9-0 lead. Bob Heatley led off the Acton batting order with a nice single over short and stole second on Russ Brush, Waterdown's veteran catcher. Tyler struck out but Skilling connected for a sharp single into centre scoring Heatley. Lawson lifted a Texas Leaguer over the hole between first and second scoring Skilling and Bruce hit over first with Lawson scoring on a passed ball. McCrystall made it to first on an error and Bruce scored on it.
