No issue of the paper next week. The wheat harvest is keeping the farmers busy. Work continues on Willow St. and Bower Ave. West in preparation for paving. On Tuesday night the C.P.R. station at Moffat was broken into. Police are investigating. Acton Citizens Band played concerts both in Acton park and in Brampton park on Sunday. The highway just east of Acton is being resurfaced this week. Lines of cars are being detoured around the workmen. There were over 5,000 in attendance at an Italian-Canadian picnic at the Melancon Farm at Eden Mills on Sunday afternoon. Some from Acton joined in the program. J. Miller, 82 Mill St., Acton, won a 24-pound bag of flour in the Palermo Men's Ball Club draw held on July 8. Another local winner of flour was Richard Chester of Campbellville. Wires have been strung between the posts by the bathing area at Fairy Lake under the supervision of Councillor L. Wiecek's parks committee, to prevent motorists and bicyclists driving along side the water. Six Highway Traffic Act violations, scheduled to be dealt with in magistrate's court here last Wednesday, were all settled out of court when fines totalling about \$30 were paid. Photos Inspire Decorating Ideas

Portrait photographs are staging a comeback. The latest news in home decoration is the part your cherished photographs can play in making your home more beautiful and friendly. In grandmother's day, portrait photographs were prominently displayed in the family album or crowded on table and piano tops. But as interiors became less ornate, this custom went out of favor and portraits tended to disappear from sight altogether. Now, however, home decorators are pointing out that because portraits are of great decorative as well as sentimental value, they belong in the home. They are advising homemakers to bring out their previous family photographs and put them on display for all to see and enjoy every day of the year. Portraits fill suit almost every room in the house, and a number of decorators have come up with suggestions for easy, do-it-yourself arrangements that are both inexpensive and artistic. For instance, you may have several old, discarded frames that will suit your favorite portraits very nicely. These frames will need only a bit of cleaning or a touch of paint to blend in with your color scheme. If you have none that you want to use, inexpensive frames of all kinds are for sale in the stores. There's one main rule to follow: use your imagination. Many people prefer frames of uniform size, symmetrically arranged. Others like a variety of frames—carved, gilt, oval, round and square—to give their portrait display dramatic interest. To achieve the most harmonious arrangement, it is a good idea to cut paper in shapes corresponding to your frames. Then stick them to the wall with bits of adhesive—or masking tape, and rearrange them until you're satisfied you have just the effect you want. If some of your prints require mounting before you frame them, it is best to use dry mounting tissue or rapid mounting cement, available at any camera supply counter. And here's an added hint: if you don't care for glass, a clear coat of plastic spray or lacquer will preserve your portraits and protect them from dust. With imagination and very simple materials, you can resurrect your precious portraits and create a picture gallery of your own that will give you, your friends and your family lasting enjoyment.
