1 Out of 10 Allergic To Ragweed

Much of the hay fever suffered annually by people in Southern Ontario is caused by Ragweed. It is estimated that one out of every ten persons in Ontario is allergic to the pollen produced by this weed.

Ragweed has other harmful effects as well. Its presence in clover seed is objectionable and it is difficult to remove, especially after the outer seed hull has been removed.

The Ragweed plant is a many branched annual with hairy stems, growing from one to three feet in height.

In the control of Ragweed, it is important to prevent the seed from setting. Fields that have been sprayed with four to six ounces of 2, 4-D are found to be relatively free from the weed.

Ragweed is everyone's problem. The Field Crops Branch advises people to learn to recognize the weed and to assist in destroying it, not only for the good of crops, but to alleviate the suffering of untold numbers of human beings.
