Permission from Wellington County Council's road committee is to be sought by Erin township to erect 30 mile speed limit signs on all county roads within the boundaries of Ballinafad, Hillsburg and Orton, it was decided at a meeting of the township council last week.

Daniel Gray, having tendered his resignation as treasurer of the township, the council decided not to accept the resignation until an audit has been completed.

The treasurer was instructed to pay the treasurer of Erin village the following for fire protection: standing as per contract from July 1, 1955 to July 1, 1956, \$300; call to the Frank Mack estate, grass fire, \$200; call to garbage dump, seventh line, \$200. Accounts were paid as follows: general accounts, \$43.85; relief accounts, \$85.80; road accounts, \$897.78.

A meeting called by the reeve was held last Friday to consider the resignation of the treasurer and what action should be taken.

Council instructed the clerk to contact the auditors and make arrangements for an audit on the treasurer's books as soon as possible.

The clerk was also authorized to advertise for applications for the position of treasurer. Duties are to commence as soon as the audit is completed.

Oakville Permits Near Half-Million

Building permits issued in Oakville for July had a total value of \$400,550, according to figures of the building inspector, Fred Shaw.

This makes a total of \$2,732,456 for the first seven months of the year, an increase of about \$700,000 over the same months last year, when the figure was \$2,027,733. Most of this year's permits have been for houses. The largest issued, \$1,404,000, was for the hospital extension, while the C.N.R. took out a \$200,000 permit for a new station.
