

Ontario Renovates Old Trading Post

TORONTO (CP) — Visitors to Wapscogamy creek will soon admire the Hudson's Bay Company trading post there. It was abandoned long ago, but the Ontario Lands and Forests Department plans to renovate it, along with other posts in the Kapuskasing district. These trading posts were founded more than 175 years ago, but most were abandoned before the turn of this century. In conjunction with their restoration program, the department plans to set up an historical library of Ontario photographs depicting everything from the province's townships, mills and industries to period clothing and recreation. The history of one of the forts is described by C. P. Wilson, editor of "The Beaver," a magazine depicting Ontario's northland. "During the summer of 1788, a post, later known as the New Brunswick, was established on Michigan lake, now called Brunswick lake. It was abandoned in the fall of 1791. "It was re-established, however, in 1800, and abandoned again in 1802, then re-established in 1805 for a year. Nothing remained of the fort in 1817 but the ditches and a few decayed stockades."

Shavings and Hay Insulate Iceberg

MONTREAL (CP)—Insulation of an iceberg has made possible the reclamation for salvage of a four-engined aircraft that crash-landed 40 miles out in Hudson Bay in early May. The crew was rescued shortly after the crash. Amos Heacock, a salvage engineer from Seattle, Wash., passing through Montreal recently, explained how 5,000 bags of wood shavings and 10 carloads of hay were flown to the iceberg and spread over a circle with the 100-yard diameter around the plane to prevent the ice melting. The aircraft, a U.S. Overseas Airlines DC-4 engaged on an airtight work on the early-warning radar line began to settle into the ice and salvage work had to be started promptly. Mr. Heacock said the wood chips kept the plane from sinking further into the ice while the hay kept the sun off. By the beginning of June, the plane was covered and equipped with 15 pontoons in case it slipped from the ice. Each pontoon was capable of supporting 13 tons. Mr. Heacock said it was necessary to wait, after completion of these operations, until the 40 miles of water back to Churchill was clear of ice. The floe was then towed back to Churchill by motorboat. At Churchill, the plane will be dismantled and shipped to New Jersey for repairs. Mr. Heacock said the job would cost about \$200,000. A new aircraft of the same type costs \$500,000.

Government Maps Cause Confusion

Michipicoten Mission, Ont. (CP) — This tiny community at the northeast corner of Lake Superior is not what the map makes it out to be. Difference of opinion between the inhabitants and the official survey made by the Ontario lands and forests department has left all concerned with a tricky question: Either the Michipicoten Mission must move their homes, alter their fences, reroute their roads and straighten their boundaries, or the department must back down and come to grips with the crooked paths of reality. Historic Error Michipicoten's dilemma goes back to the early days when all travel was by water and rumors of gold sent adventurers streaming into the area. Obvious landing stages for the prospectors was the old Hudson's Bay Company post at Michipicoten Mission. Seeing a boomtown, a land-speculating company bought up all available land and turned it on paper at least into neat 25-foot building lots. To top off their routine vision, the speculators even gave the tent-settlement a new name, "Michipicoten City," but it didn't live up to its grandiose title. Since the boom never came, Michipicoten Mission never took the shape its planners had ordained and little attention was paid to the lines of the old plan. Streets followed the steepest water tracks through the bush; lot lines followed the existing streets. In 1853 the department of lands and forests ordered a complete new survey of the community. The visiting surveyor was apparently torn between legality and reality. Homeowners termed the results "confusing." Not one of the village's roads is in the same place as the new map shows it to be. Many don't even run in the same direction. It's the same with the old buildings. One property owner has been asked by the department to move a building because it is shown in the middle of a planned road which in fact does not exist. Buildings in a similar dilemma include the school house, shown as situated far from the planned school property, and the church standing in the middle of the planned main road in the area. Signs that the officials in Toronto actually believe in their plan aroused interest of Michipicoten Mission residents in their topography situation. Result is a petition calling for a re-survey in accordance with the actual community. Copies of the petition have been sent to the department of lands and forests, C. Harry Lions, MPP for South St. Marie riding, and Premier Leslie Frost. Officials are challenged to rebuild all roads in the area to
