Because he considers Councillor John Davidson's suit for damages "frivolous and trivial", Bronte reeve Thomas Millward, through the Toronto law firm of Cameron, Well-ton, Brewin and McCallum, has asked that Davidson file security for Supreme Court costs before September 12.

Mr. Brewin of the Toronto law firm said he was filing the order under the Public Authorities Protection Act, returnable by September 12. Oakville lawyers said the Act was seldom used.

Meanwhile, Councillor Davidson said this week he intended to take his seat at the council table at the Village Fathers' next meeting today, a day after the sewer referendum.
