Halton's Hidden Beauty

Sparkling Waterfall Near Time-Worn Stonework Recalls Lively Bustle of Sawmill at Hilton's Falls a Century Ago



OLD STONE ARCH is all that is left of the mill race which channelled the water from above the falls down to the power-providing wheel located behind the wall shown here. The old dam on the stream, its limestone structure now crumbling, was built without mortar. Today the imagination can conjure much of the activity that is now part of Halton's past.

A sparkling stream flowing steadily through a good stand of pine forest, held back by a substantial dam, built laboriously and expertly from the abundant limestone in the area, speeds through the mill race and pounds down over the revolving water wheel.

The scene is a busy one as the wheel generates the needed power for a saw mill in the midst of nature's original beauty.

That must have been the picture a century ago at one of Halton's most beautiful hidden waterfalls in the headwaters of the Sixteen that winds its way through Milton to the lake at Oakville.

Taking advantage of a natural drop of 18 to 20 feet, the early settlers constructed one of the industry's most practical and most necessary for those days—a saw mill.

Today Hilton Falls, just north of the Campbellville side road, on the property of W. J. Mahon, is one of the many beauty spots that abound in Halton amid natural surroundings—spots with a historic background that takes the visitor back a century.

Stone quarrying in the limestone was of a high quality because in the dam, now remaining only in part, no mortar was used to retain the structure that was at least six feet high.

The mill race, behind which would be located the large water wheel, was also of limestone with a perfect arch formed for the water to escape through on its return to the river below the falls.

Following the now dry mill race back to the dam over the tangled brush and through the channel deepened by the regular flow of water, it is a simple matter to view the bustling scene of a century ago.

But present day Hilton's Falls leaves nothing to the imagination in painting its picture of natural

beauty. Tumbling down over the edge of the 18 foot drop, the sparkling waters gather in a shallow pool at the base before continuing their course. The innumerable layers of limestone bear testimony to the amount of stone in the area.

Not far from the falls, but on what must once have been another course of water is a deep hole four feet across. Nicknamed "Devil's Hole", the rock-formed circular hole bears evidence of earlier whirlpool action from water that must once have flowed there.

Now covered with initials scratched on the smoothly rounded rock surface, the hole indicates that a good sized river once flowed but dried up at least a century ago.

Only a little further along a second fall, would have carried the rushing waters to the lower level and swelled the Sixteen.

Halton has many beauty spots, in the headwaters of streams; the deep bush trails, the great escarpment, the narrow roads.

A fall approaches, travelling the roads of Halton, the off-beat paths can reveal a profusion of color, a beauty in nature unequalled in other parts of the country.
