

### Traf. May Ask Land, Not Cash

A motion by Trafalgar township council to take five per cent. of subdivision lands for park areas, rather than cash, in all future dealings, was referred to the next council meeting.

The motion was drawn up after considerable discussion and it was pointed out that by taking land the five per cent. would not decrease in value as properties increased. Deputy-rev. Don Bath explained that if cash was taken, by the time council was ready to purchase lands for park areas, property values were liable to increase to where the cash received amounted to considerably less than the original five per cent.

"We should take land every time," Mr. Bath asserted. "When we wish to acquire park lands, we can sell this land for the current market price." He pointed out that if the five per cent. came to a fraction of a lot, "the price for the full lot can be negotiated."

Commented Councillor Alec Phillips: "We will have the subdividers down on our necks on this deal."

Mr. Bath said it was "the fairest deal that the Parks Board could come up with at the moment."

Councillor Harry Sewell believed the matter should rest for a week before any decision was made and the motion was tabled.

### To Present Figures For Police Building

The Trafalgar township police department will present cost figures for a new township police building to the township council, as an aid in determining whether such a building will be constructed at this time.

Sergeant Harry Wilson, appearing before council as a representative of the police department, asked if council desired a figure of cost on a police building. Reeve Robert Marshall said that council planned to view other municipal buildings and investigate costs and construction features.

### Custom Receipts Lower in August

August receipts at the Oakville Customs office amounted to \$65,207.87. This was considerably less than in July, according to E. C. Cox, Collector of Customs, who explained that the decline was due to the fact that a number of local plants were closed for vacation and were not bringing in material. Returns for this year so far were somewhat ahead of last, Mr. Cox said.

### New Savings Plan Started by Nelson

Nelson township council has decided on a new plan for investment funds obtained from various subdivision developments. \$19,000 is to be invested in savings certificates with the recently established Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Co.

The money has accumulated through the sale of township-owned properties, such as dedicated lands in subdivisions. Interest will be paid by the Trust company at the rate of three per cent. and the township is required to give 10 days' notice when making any withdrawals.

Reeve Harold C. Adkins said the new plan would mean a greater income from the township's savings account since the bank interest previously was at the rate of one per cent.

### Trafalgar Child Killed on Dundas

Four-year-old Nancy Harris of R.R. 1, Oakville, was killed on Wednesday, September 7 when she darted across the Dundas Highway at Trafalgar and collided with a truck carrying cattle.

Mrs. John Harris, her mother, said the girl had gone across the road to the store to return a pop bottle, when the accident occurred.

The driver of the truck was Albert Boys, 20, of Guelph. He told police that the girl darted into his path before he had time to apply the brakes. He said he was only going 40 miles an hour.

For many years Trafalgar township has had an enviable child accident record due to a wide spread safety program. This was the first fatal traffic accident involving a child in eight years in that district.

### Nelson to Survey Its Hydro Equipment

With a view to taking over the transmissions and distribution of electrical power as a public utility throughout the township, Nelson council has ordered a complete survey of hydro equipment in the township. The inventory will be made by H.E.P.C. of Ontario at a cost of \$3,000, to be financed by the township.

The possibility of acquiring the hydro rights has been mentioned frequently at council meetings and discussions with commission officials have produced estimated figures "showing that if the township operated its own electrical system as a public utility, there would be a saving to the residential and industrial users, with no change to farm users and a slight increase for commercial users."

Provincial hydro officials informed the council no further steps could be taken until a complete inventory of hydro equipment in the township was made. This would include all poles, lines and other equipment to determine the exact cost to the township in the event council decided to take it over. Funds for the cost of the survey will be paid from the township's subdivision account.

### William L. Turner Joins Police Force

William L. Turner, a former member of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Dundas, has joined the Nelson township police department. He was introduced to council by Chief Constable Harvey Hunt at a recent meeting shortly after a motion of Crs. Edgar George and Harold Stewart made the appointment official and set his starting salary at \$3,409 for a three months' probationary period.

### 2,850 Burlington School Children Set New Record in Five Schools

The largest number of children in the history of Burlington showed up in classrooms of the high school, three public schools and St. John's Separate school as they swung open their doors for a new year on Tuesday morning. For the five institutions the total number enrolled on opening day was 2,850.

Nelson township schools likewise reported an unprecedented growth with 1,615 enrolled the first day. As in town schools, the number was expected to be increased slightly before the week ended.

### Hours By-Law Read First Time

A by-law which would shift Saturday night opening hours to Friday night for at least 18 Acton merchants was read a first time in Acton council last week after members were presented with a petition claiming 75 per cent. support for the new hours in seven classifications of business listed.

Although the by-law, repealing former store hours by-laws, got through its first stage, council considered it was still not satisfied of the accuracy of some of the designations. Members questioned particularly the "Food Market" classification.

### Use Subway at Q.E. Intersection

Nelson council has decided to request the Ontario Department of Highways to continue King's Road across the Q. E. Way in its plans for the proposed non-access highway approach to the Skyway Bridge. A resolution asking for a subway at the intersection was given unanimous approval at a special meeting of the council.

The resolution read that "this council go on record as being in unanimous favor of the continuance of King's Road as a through street where it is at present bisected by the Q. E. Way, with the provision of either an underpass or an overpass from east to west, and that the Department of Highways should be notified regarding this resolution."
