McCready had about 60 firsts, about 25 seconds and about 10 thirds. McPhail had about 25 firsts, 14 seconds and five thirds. D. R. Allan had about 23 firsts, over 20 seconds and seven thirds.

D. Wilson had 14 firsts, over 10 seconds and thirds. Dodds had about 15 firsts, eight seconds, and a third. Capeland had about 10 firsts and seconds and fewer thirds. Stoddart took about 10 firsts with fewer seconds and thirds. Ken Bailey and Spence also took several awards.
