Campbellville in Championship Form, Beats Sunderland 13 to 7

Campbellville journeyed to Sunderland on Saturday, October 1 for the first game of the O.B.A. Intermediate C finals, and won it 13 to 7.

Sunderland had reached the finals by defeating Marmora, Bancroft (victors over Sydenham) and Beeton, whereas Campbellville had eliminated Berham Centre, Durham and Corunna (who had defeated Delhi and Mitchell).

Before a large crowd Sunderland got away to a good start in the first inning. With two out, Lehman tripped and scored when Earl Cairns dropped a throw from Moore on Thompson's grounder. Miller then blasted a home run into centre field to make it 3-0 for Sunderland. The challengers made it 4-0 in the second when Learyod singled and was driven in by Beaton's double.

At the end of the third, things looked bad for Campbellville as Sunderland had scored another to make it 5-0 when Farrell walked, went to third on an error and scored on a wild pitch.

Campbellville started to come to life in the fourth when Earl Cairns doubled and Stan Henderson homered into left field to make the score 5-2 for Sunderland.

It was in the fifth that Campbellville really unleashed their power and showed Sunderland why they are champions. Wingrove, Laking and Early all singled and Earl Cairns was safe on the pitcher's error. Stan Henderson then blasted his second consecutive home run to make it five runs in the inning with still none out. Bill Cairns then doubled but Elliot struck out and Dredge popped up to make it two out. But Moore, Wingrove and Laking singled in succession and Early homered to make it 10 runs in the inning. Earl Cairns singled but Henderson popped up to end the rally Campbellville 12, Sunderland 5.

Campbellville stretched the lead to 13-5 in the seventh when Wingrove singled, went to third on McPhail's single and came home when the two-of-them-worked-the-double steal.

In the bottom of the seventh Sunderland scored twice to complete the scoring. Beaton doubled off the wall of the arena in deep left field and tried to stretch it into a triple. A fast accurate relay from Early to Dredge to Moore had him beat but Moore dropped the ball and he was safe at third. Thompson singled Beaton home and got to third on two wild pitches. Thompson scored as Miller was being thrown out at first by Wingrove. Campbellville 13, Sunderland 7.

Schell and O'Brien shared mound duties for Sunderland, giving up 18 hits while walking one and striking out 11. Stan Henderson hurled six

one-third innings for Campbellville, giving up seven runs of eight hits and two walks. He struck out eight. Roberts hurled the last two and two-thirds innings, giving up three hits while striking out three.

Beaton hit a triple and two doubles for Sunderland and Farrell had a triple and two singles. Miller homered, Lehman tripped and Learyod, Thompson and Schell all singled.

Allan Wingrove led the Campbellville attack with a double and three singles. Stan Henderson hit two homers and a single, Earl Cairns a double and two singles, Lloyd Early a home run and a single, Bill Cairns a double and single, and Ken Moore and Bob McPhail singled.

Campbellville came up with the two fielding gems of the game. In the first inning Lloyd Early made a sensational running catch of Learyod's line drive and with a man on first in the fifth Wingrove fumbled Schell's grounder, recovered, stepped on second and fired to first to complete a double play.
