

Corunna Loses To Campbellville 10-8 in 13 Innings

In a tense, thrilling action-packed 13 inning ball game, Campbellville defeated Corunna 10-8 in Corunna on Wednesday, September 28 to win the O.B.A. Intermediate C finals.

With the score tied 8-8, Ken Moore opened the 13th inning with a single. McPhail sacrificed him to second and Moore went to third when Henderson was safe at first on a throwing error by Corunna's third baseman.

Bill Cairns then sent a lazy pop back of third. Kibreth, the Corunna third baseman, called for the ball but it bounced off his finger into left field. Henderson and Early scampered across the plate to give Campbellville a two run lead that this time they refused to relinquish as Roberts set down the middle of the hard hitting Corunna batting order.

Campbellville had opened the scoring in the first inning when, with none on and two out, Henderson homered over the right field fence. Corunna came back with two in the bottom of the first to take a 2-1 lead.

With one out in the sixth, Elliott singled and went to third on Bill Cairns' single. Cairns' second and when the third baseman let a throw from the catcher, trying to catch Elliott off third, go into left field, both Elliott and Cairns scored.

Kilbreath opened the bottom of the eighth with a single. An infield out advanced both runners and when Hamilton failed to get the runner at the plate on Brown's roller, men were on first and third and one run was in.

Early opened the tenth with a walk and Elliott sacrificed him to second. Earl Cairns was walked purposely and Campbellville brought in Seaney to hit for Dredge. Seaney smashes the first ball thrown to him over third to bring in Early and Roberts' single scored Earl Cairns. Campbellville 8; Corunna 6.

But Corunna were not through yet. Curran walked to open the bottom of the tenth and went to second as Roberts took the next man at first. Fly to centre made it two out and Lockery tripled to score Curran and cut the margin to one run. Roberts got two strikes away from victory when the Corunna second baseman singled in Lockery to tie the score 8-8 and force the game another three innings.

Lockery and Anderson handled the hurling for Corunna and gave up 13 hits and three walks. They struck out seven and hit one batter. Hamilton worked seven and one-third innings for Campbellville, giving up six runs of 10 hits and three walks. Roberts pitched the final five and two-thirds innings, allowing two runs off five hits. He walked two, struck out three and hit one batter.
