OBITUARY

Distant Relative Of U.S. President

A distant relative of William McKinley, assassinated president of the United States, Thomas McKimley, 89, died suddenly on Sunday, October 9, in Milton, where he had been a resident two years.

Mr. McKimley, who was a native of Linwood, had previously lived in Georgetown. As a young man he was employed with the Toronto street railway, later went west where he homesteaded for many years near Winnipeg.

He was burned out and came to Georgetown about 17 years ago. Unmarried, his closest survivors are a sister, Mrs. Thomas Williams of Toronto; his nephew Jim and niece, Mrs. Charles J. Day of Georgetown.

Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service in Georgetown on Monday, October 10. Interment was made the next morning in Park Lawn cemetery, Toronto.

British Ambassador Opens Winter Fair

Sir Roger Makins, GCMG, KCB, the British Ambassador at Washington, will officially open the 1955 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair to be held in the Coliseum, Toronto, in November. It was announced by the Royal's General Manager, C. S. McKee.

A gala and colorful opening ceremony has been planned to launch this year's Royal, which will attract more than 18,000 entries from all parts of Canada. Taking part in the official opening ceremonies with Sir Roger Makins will be Lt. Col. Stuart C. Bate, president of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and His Worship, Mayor Nathan Phillips.

Mayor Phillips will extend a welcome to teams from the United States, Mexico, Ireland and Canada that will compete in the International Jumping Competitions at this year's Royal.

The Earl of Dalkeith, M.P.H. of D. Boswells, Rosburghshire, Scotland, the only son and heir of the Duke of Buccleuch, will be one of the 1955 Royal Horse Show judges.
