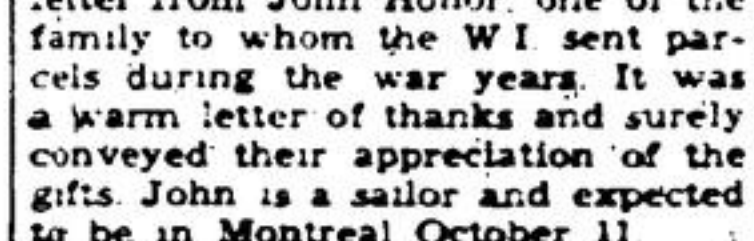
BORDER AIRPORT
