Cow Sets Record In South Africa

Several Jerseys cows from Halton county have gone to South Africa in years gone by. One of the latest to have her production reported is a cow bred by Maurice Beatty, Lindale Jersey Farm, at Milton. She is known in South Africa as Montsarie Arundel Tiny and at four years and three months has produced 8,073 lbs. of milk and 489 lbs. of fat, with a test of 6.06 per cent. in 300 days.

This cow is a daughter of Mr. Beatty's former herd sire, Brampton Basil, who did so much to bring the Lindale herd to its present high standard.
