In excess of 1952's consumption had been allowed but now learned that this was only for one year and no rebate would be forthcoming on 1954 consumption.

He suggested that it was not entirely fair that the rebate should apply for one year only, pointing out that with consumption of 3.4 million more gallons in 1954 than in 1952, water charged at normal rates on this high quantity would be an expensive proposition.

He noted further that the company was glad to get the water at the time but that the town was also glad to get the extra revenue through sale of the water. The water, without the preferred allowance, is not practical at current industrial rates, he indicated.

Buy Post-Hole Digger?

Commission members answered that council had initiated this action the company was questioning and felt they could take no further action unless council did so first. Records are to be studied in connection with the rebate agreement.

Members discussed at length a bill for rewinding two motors. Payment was finally approved after some dispute about company obligation.

The commission learned it could buy a post hole digger for \$17.74. After some talk about the pros and cons of buying such a machine, it was agreed there was not enough of this work to warrant the expense.

In further discussion about a digger, superintendent D. Mason said there may be one available from the Bell Telephone Co. at Brampton for \$135. This is to be looked into. It was also learned that a digger can be rented from Ontario Hydro for \$5 per hour plus an operator.

Repair Old Truck

The commission was notified that a service call is expected shortly from a representative of the United Steel Corp. at the local sewage treatment plant.

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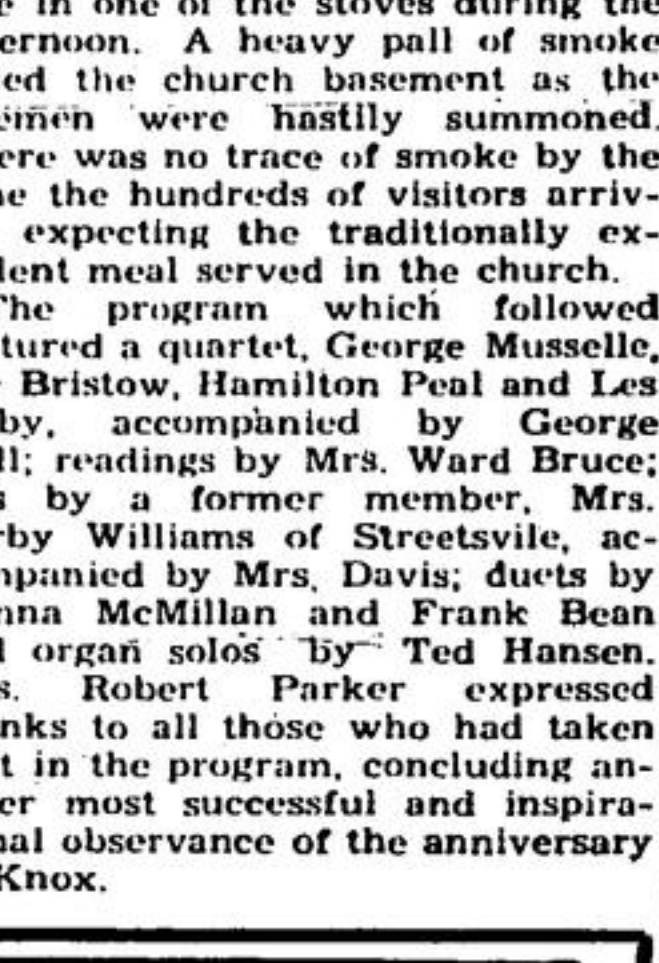
