### Anti-Shooting By-Law Defeated By Close Esqueusing Council Vote

A by-law aimed at prohibiting the discharge of guns or other fire arms in Esqueusing township was voted down at council meeting in Stewartstown on Monday, October 17. The by-law was moved by councillors George Currie and Spencer Wilson.

A recorded vote was called on the contentious issue with three members opposed, Reeve Wilfrid Bird, Deputy-reeve Walter Linham and Councillor Campbell Sinclair. The third reading of the by-law was turned down.

Council agreed to take an option on a 50-50 basis with the township of Trafalgar on the King property in Trafalgar for park purposes.

Members agreed to accept \$750 for alone on the unopened road allowance between concession eight and nine in lots 26 and 27 of the township of Esqueusing.

Sympathy of council and township officials was expressed to former clerk I. M. Bennett.

Claims for foxes paid was \$3 to Edward Bailey. Accounts for sheep destroyed were paid to John Black amounting to \$60 with \$4 to Duncan Waldie, the valuator.

Accounts paid and charged to the Esqueusing Fire Area No. 1 included Scott Motors \$7.29; Western Auto Supply \$1.34; town of Georgetown, five fires, \$220.

Halton Registry Office was paid \$2.15; H.E.P.C. \$48.16; Bell Telephone \$18.55; the Poppy Day Fund was granted \$15 and the N. and G. championship lacrosse team, \$100.

### Deer Licenses Cause Confusion

So far, some confusion exists in official circles as to the issuance of deer hunting licenses. County council has passed necessary legislation to permit the hunt in all areas of the county except those where the shooting of firearms is restricted, as it is in built-up areas and towns.

In Esqueusing township, a by-law to prohibit the shooting of firearms there was defeated last week. Complaints against hunting in the area are common.

Dudley Hitchcox, the game warden, is away at the present time. C. R. Groves, the zone forester of the Department of Lands and Forests, was also unavailable for comment.

Neither the county nor township officers appear sure as to the procedure for selling the licenses. A Featherstone had none to sell at his office. County clerk William Dean thought the townships were to handle the sale, however.

### Baha'i Persecution Results In Appeal

A Committee of Baha'i administrators from many countries of the world has gathered in the last ten days in Geneva to prepare, with the assistance of renowned international counsels, an appeal to the United Nations to request its intervention in the persecution which is afflicting the followers of the Baha'i religion; the largest minority in Iran (estimate 500,000).

The appeal, supported by proofs and documentation, formally presented on August 1, requests that the United Nations and its member governments investigate in "joint and separate action", as provided for in the Charter of the United Nations, to prevent further persecution and to remedy the injustice perpetrated against them and to restore the freedom to practise their faith in places of worship in Iran now partly demolished, closed or seized.

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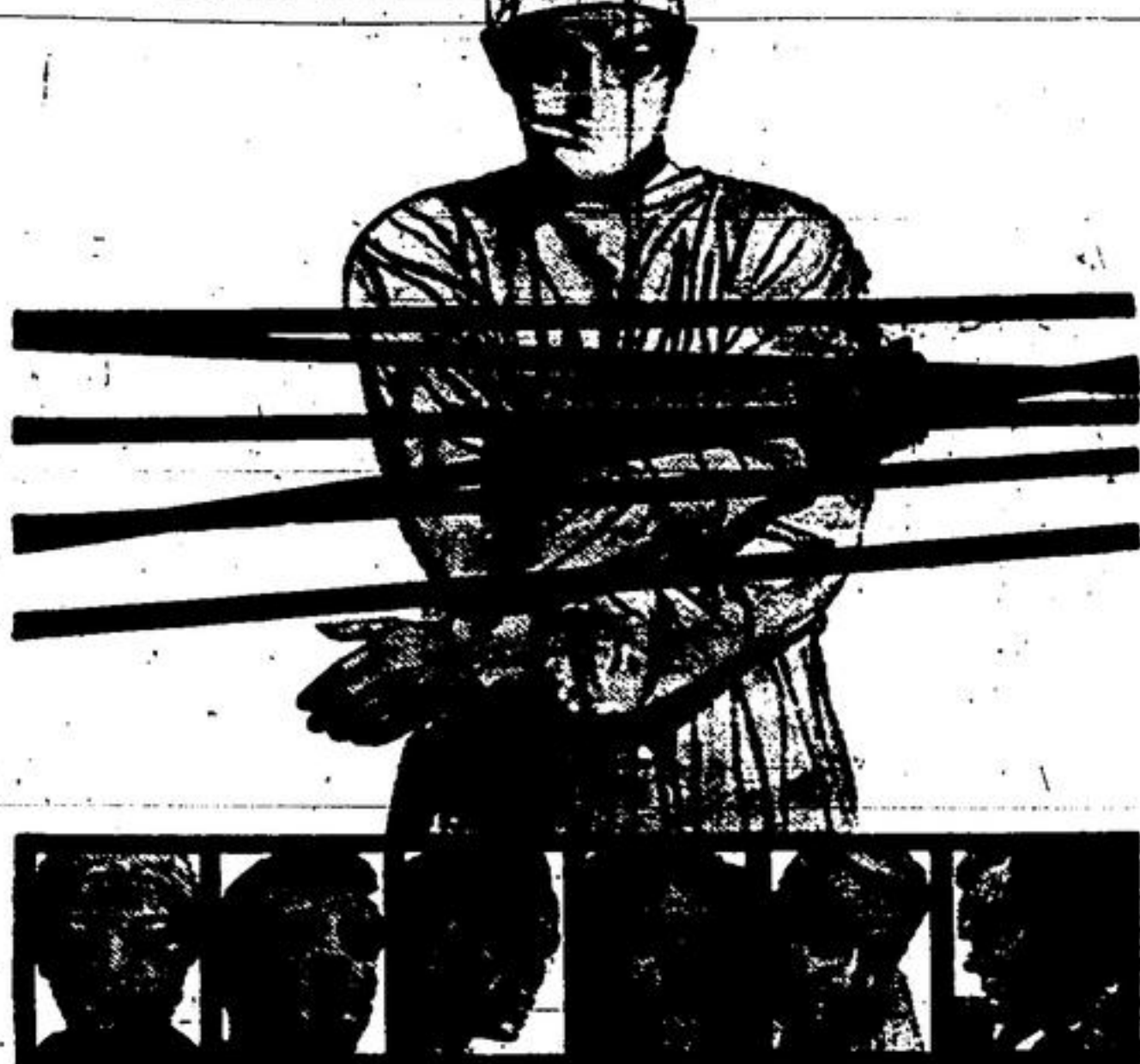
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
