An unexpectedly good crowd of about 150 watched with excitement the first games of the Halton Junior Farmers' hockey league in Milton arena on Monday. Milton defeated Acton 7-3 and Norval defeated Palermo 11-5.

There are four teams in the Junior Farmers' hockey league again this year and each plays every Monday evening in Milton. The Milton team is stronger than last year, with the addition of the Tassers who formerly played for Palermo. Norval has made several changes in its line-up and is also expected to be a more powerful aggregation this winter.

The Acton team has three new

players from last year's Juvenile team, Paul Lawson, Bob Coon and Ted Powell, as well as Gordon Overland from Hillsburgh. Again with the team are Ralph Deblauw, Leonard Thompson, Mac Sprowl, Calvin Sprowl, Lawrence Hensley, Charlie Thompson from Acton, and Dan McKenzie, George Wheeler and Bert Wheeler from Hillsburgh. Herb Woods, goal keeper on the Acton Intermediate championship winning team of 1939, who coached last year's Juveniles, is the coach.

Members of the hockey teams must attend 50 per cent. of the Junior Farmers' regular meetings in order to be eligible to play hockey.

Practice This Weekend

Re-Form Jr. Hockey Club

For the first time since the late Dr. Sims and Ilio Marzo had a smart team in the O.H.A., Acton is to have a junior hockey team.

At a meeting on November 5, the Acton Junior D hockey club was formed and has been registered with the O.H.A. W. J. Coon is president of the club. Other officers are vice-president, F. G. Oakes, and secretary-treasurer Billy Middleton. Ed Foothill is the team manager, Ilio Marzo the coach and Enzo Marzo the assistant coach and trainer.

The first practice is being held this week in Milton, and from then

on the line-ups will be arranged. Altogether 14 players attended a recent meeting and more from the district as well as the town are expected to try out.

The club doesn't know yet what teams will comprise the league. They may play a double schedule with Orangeville and Hespeler, or may, as Hespeler did last year, have a bye into the O.H.A. playoffs. Games will likely be played in Milton until there is ice here.

The last junior team to represent Acton went well into the O.H.A. playoffs before being eliminated by Milverton in a see-saw struggle

that was finally decided at Hespeler in the seventh game of the best of seven series. Graduates from that team have done well for themselves with other district teams, some of them going into professional hockey for a stint.

They include Harold Townsley, now with Milton Co-ops, Fred Keener, also with Milton, Bill Vaughan, a Milton boy, now with the Co-ops, Terry Finch with Georgetown and several other players who confine their game principally to industrial and rural hockey.

Ilio Marzo, who coached both the last junior team here and the crack club of the year previous, which was eliminated by Orangeville, will also coach this year's edition, aided and abetted by brother "Ich". Both the Marzo brothers played intermediate hockey here for years, being members of the 1939 champions and also with the 1949 champions.

Officials hope to drum up a lot of enthusiasm for the team. They can see that with the right kind of coaching it won't be long until Acton is once more prominent in the hockey annals of the O.H.A.

Simultaneously with the junior announcement word comes from Milton that Moffat is entering a team in the O.H.A. Intermediate C in a league comprised of Milton, Aurora and Waterdown. The Moffat team will be a Moffat-Acton combine with several Acton players likely to take part.
