and C. Cook to the N.H.S.D. Board were raised.

Mayor Tyler reported on a recent meeting with Bell Telephone officials regarding improvement of service here. He noted two more switchboard panels are to be added and service is to be examined.

A request from the Glenlea section of the Ratepayers' Association for bus service for their public school children was read. This request is to be passed over to the public school board.

Council was told, after receiving the signed contract from the Gaffney Construction Co. for the Maria St. bridge, that steel shortages would delay the work start date.

Here Mr. Cook rose again to ask when the town took over the Maria St. bridge and from whom.

Obligation to the Crescent

The Mayor replied that councils in recent years have considered, hampered by the absence of minutes, that the town took over the bridge when the road was assumed through this section. The Boardmore Co. was given permission to put a cutting through and maintain the bridge within its frame of use at that time.

Now, Mayor Tyler continued, with the establishment of Maria St. as a town road, the heavy flow of traffic and the necessity to provide a proper entry for fire equipment into the Crescent, the town feels obligated to provide citizens in this area with a safe and adequate bridge.

"But if council shouldn't own the bridge," Mr. Cook persisted, couldn't the real owner close the bridge if he wanted to?"

"Remember," Mayor Tyler replied, "it's a town road as well as 'You'll Get Used to It'."

Reference to the lamery caused a remark about the odor Mr. Cook deplored at the last Ratepayers' meeting.

"When you've been here long enough, you'll get used to the smell," Deputy Reeve Fosditt advised.

Council heard a letter of thanks to the town for indigent care of a sick husband and father. The writer said the family is grateful for the way the town has concerned itself with her family.

Councillor J. Newton was delegated council's representative to formulating a Parks Commission here.

Clerk J. McGeachie tabled the first copy of the auditor's statement to the end of October. This statement will be prepared for public circulation Nomination Night.

Endorse Safety Campaign

Council agreed to issue a proclamation endorsing a highway safety campaign sponsored by the Ontario Safety League.

First reading was given to a by-law to provide for watermain installation in the Lakeview subdivision.

Members briefly discussed aspects of a meeting to be held this week with Esqueving Council dealing with annexation compensation.

Councillors Newton and Langford drew attention to several catch basins about town in need of attention.

Reeve Hargrave initiated discussion about supervision and teaming at the arena this year. Two men were mentioned who might, if approached, take on the duties involved. They are to be contacted.

About Day-Long Parkers

Dr. F. G. Oakes, a spectator through Monday night's session, asked council if something might not be done to dissuade day-long parking on downtown Hill St. Many of the offending cars belonged to local merchants, he said, and suggested the business section would benefit if this parking were reduced. Council agreed to pass the problem over to the Chamber of Commerce.
