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County Secretary Is Union Speaker

A meeting of the Balaclava Farm Union Local was held in the community hall on Wednesday, November 16, at which the Wellington County Secretary, Lloyd Houston, was the guest speaker. He

gave an account of the achievements, progress and aims of the Ontario Farmers' Union. In a period of three years, this Union has grown from two locals to 100 locals. The Union is now accepted by press, radio, government, agricultural bodies and labor unions. The group has done a great deal toward educating themselves to orderly producer-controlled marketing. A brief to the Ontario Hog Producers proved beneficial. A brief to the grain commissioners and to the Dominion government also had its reward to all farmers buying western grain.

Labor groups were met, which resulted in better understanding between the producer and the consumer. Machinery dealers were met. The Union movement spread out in British Columbia, furthering their aim of a "National organization from coast to coast". They continue to seek legislation from the Provincial government to aid in the setting up of producer controlled marketing schemes. They are supporting the erection of a northern University and assisting Sudbury district farmers in their fight against sulphur fume damage. Steps have been taken to put a monthly provincial Union paper in every members' home.

A discussion period followed, after which the meeting adjourned.
