Mrs. Peter Smith Dies In 95th Year

One of Acton's most highly respected senior citizens, Mrs. Peter A. Smith passed away on Tuesday, November 15, Mrs. Smith had attained the age of 95 years but her keen interest and brightness were never indicative of her age. A couple of weeks ago she suffered a fall at her home and sustained a fractured hip. The shock proved too much for her and in spite of tender care she passed away in hospital in Toronto.
 Until the time of her last illness, Mrs. Smith was a regular attendant at her church services in the United church, took her usual keen interest in the Duke of Devonshire chapter of the I.O.G.E. of which she was a councillor and the other church and town associations which had claimed her attention over the years.
 Mrs. Smith, the former Addie D. Sargent, came to Acton with her husband, the late Peter Smith, 34 years ago from Brantford. Mrs. Smith lived with her daughter, Miss Pearl Smith in their large, attractive home on Main St.
 Mrs. Smith was born in 1870 and was married in 1888.
 Friends and relatives attended the funeral services in her home on Friday, November 19, when many beautiful flowers indicated the esteem in which she was held in the community. Three ministers took part in the service: Rev. Gordon Adams was her pastor, Rev. Walter G. Foster of Brantford, and Rev. W. A. Smith of Acton. The son of her minister in Brantford, Rev. Egerton Young of Toronto, read a sympathetic message; his father had written on his Braille typewriter that morning.

It included the following verse: "The Lily and its Maker. The lily caught its Maker's eye. Not for its happy place. But in the spot it found its life. It shone with perfect grace."
 And so this mother, loved, trusted in all her length of days. Has lived a life of loyal love. And to her Master's praise.

Funeral services were held in the United church on Saturday, November 20, at 10 o'clock. Rev. W. A. Smith officiated. Burial was in the Brantford cemetery.
