until midnight to separate and count as many as five ballot slips. Present scale is \$9 and \$7 for deputy-returning officers and clerks.

One councillor observed that in view of a likely light vote next Monday, the heavier day last Monday would be balanced by the easier day next Monday.

Reeve Hargrave recommended there be no change in the fee paid Mayor Tyler and Councillor R. Langford indicated support of extra monetary consideration. When a show of hands vote was called, only one arm was raised in favor.

Given Use of Arena

The minor sports organization was given permission to use the arena Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights. Clerk McGeachie reported arrangements have been made to manage the arena and for ice-making this winter.

Deputy-Reeve Footitt asked that something be done to curb cars now parking on sidewalks on Mill and Elgin Street locations. This started an exchange of views on general parking conditions and it was eventually decided to erect new signs reading, "No Parking From Here to Corner", where needed at Mill and Main Streets.

Councillor Lindsay urged a sharp curve sign or buffer plate be installed for protection against cars skidding in icy weather at the curve of Young St. into Mill St. This is to be looked into.

As Council adjourned, brief attention was given to extension of services to a Cobble Hill house now being erected.
