Veteran Cook Claims Women Overcook Christmas Turkeys

Most housewives overcook their Christmas turkeys, according to Joseph F. Nellis, chef instructor of the Canadian National Railways sleeping and dining car department. The "little woman" gets up early in the morning to put the "bird" in the oven and roast it for several hours, says chef-Nellis. "No wonder it is considered dry by the time it reaches the dining table."

The veteran chef, who has spent more than 35 years in kitchens on dining, steamer, hotels and restaurants of the C.N.R., says three to three and a half hours is all the time required to cook a 20 pound turkey.

Rudolph Returns To Native Scotland

Rudolph the reindeer has returned to his native Scotland. After seven centuries of extinction, the entered animals have been brought again to the heather covered Scottish highlands by a Lapp herdsman.

The Lapp, Mikel Utsi, has imported a pioneer herd of reindeer into Scotland from his native Lapland. With the blessing of the British Ministry of Agriculture, Utsi is hoping to breed reindeer as a new industry for the Scots. He hopes that one day reindeer will again roam sheep from many parts of the highlands.

Utsi has formed a company to import reindeer from his ranch home in Swedish Lapland and maintain them on a Scottish reserve in the forest glens of Invernesshire. The reserve is covered with the gray lichen or "reindeer moss" on which the animals feed for most of the year.

Reindeer, the Lapp says, are much easier to keep than sheep. They need no protection in snow storms and no attention at calving time. Once they become accustomed, they stay in the same place year round. And those wicked looking antlers are no trouble. Utsi says, because reindeer are friendly creatures once they get used to you.

Special Sparkle For Lights, Silver

The electric candle in the window and the tree lights will be just that much prettier if each bulb is rubbed with a soft sponge, rinsed with hot water and polished with a soft cloth before they're put up. Make sure, of course, that all are disconnected first and that each bulb is perfectly dry before being replaced in its socket.

The special equipment that you bring out at Christmas can add its note of sparkle to your house, too. Give nutcrackers and picks a coat of silver polish. Then wash them in hot soap suds, rinse in hot water and rub with a soft dry cloth. Give the glass and china bowls and containers you'll use for nuts, candy and fruit a special "sparkling" and polish them until they glisten. They will all contribute their share of sparkle and gaiety.

By-Law No. 21-55

A By-law to prohibit the parking or leaving of vehicles on the roads of the Township of Esquesing during certain seasons.

WHEREAS, in order to facilitate the control of ice and snow on the Township roads, it is desirable to prohibit the parking, parking or leaving of motor or other vehicles on the roads of the Township of Esquesing during certain seasons.

AND WHEREAS, the power to prohibit the placing of obstructions on roads and highways, is conferred on local municipalities by Sub-section 1 of Section 486 of the Municipal Act, Chapter 243, R.S.O. 1950.

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ESQUESING ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. No person or company shall between the 1st day of December in one year and the 1st day of April in the following year, park or leave any motor or other vehicle on any Township road.

2. Any person convicted before a Court of competent jurisdiction of an infraction of this By-law shall be subject to a fine not less than Five dollars (\$5.00) and not more than Fifteen dollars (\$15.00) exclusive of costs.

3. A motor vehicle stalled and abandoned in a snow drift shall not be deemed to be parked contrary to this By-law, but in such case the Township employees shall have the authority to call a garage, and have the stalled vehicle removed at the owner's expense.

Read a first and second times, the 6th day of December, 1955.

Read a third time, and passed the 6th day of December, 1955.
