**Ontario Mechanic Heads For Arabia**

Sudbury (CP)—Paul Bouchard's itchy foot will take him from Northern Ontario to Saudi Arabia.

Since 1948 he has worked as a mechanic in a steel plant in Sault Ste. Marie and as a veneer scaler in logging camps. He has had to work in Saudi Arabia.

The 42-year-old Bouchard has been shuttling across the Atlantic since he was four years old. He was that age when his parents brought him to Canada from Charenton, France.

Later, he says, he attended a military academy in France and served with the French Foreign Legion in North Africa, where he won the French Croix de Guerre. He spent his last year with the legion in the air corps, served with the RCAF during the Second World War and later with the Free French air force.

Bouchard has a particular love of machine work. He makes scale models of ships and airplanes—a model of a guillotine. He has built one that works, on a small scale.
