Scots' Barn Idea

Tested in Quebec

Lennoxville, Que. (CP)—A number of Eastern Township farmers are trying out "pole" barns, and wondering why it took them so long to test an idea which Scottish farmers have been using for decades.

The barns, built on poles instead of concrete foundations, are open on one side, permitting cattle to come and go as they please.

Farmer West Nichol, one of the first to build a pole barn here, says it's a great labor-saver. His herd of Herefords spent the winter in the structure, 72 by 58 feet. Construction cost was \$4,500, about \$2,000 less than a standard barn.

"I find my cattle much healthier in the spring and the calves stronger too," he added.

Nichol said most of the barns being tested here are practical only for beef cattle, which put on a warm layer of fat during the summer. Some farmers however were building them to accommodate dairy cattle.
