## Council Takes Urgent Action to Pipe Water Into Town to Bolster Reserve Engineers to Report on Cost, Data On Three Possible Area Sources

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A. K. Mann brought in the report of the Kirk Session in which the office bearers of the various organizations were commended for the faithful discharge of their duties. Sympathy was expressed to the families of eight members of Knox church who had passed away during the year. The Session report showed that there has been an increase in the amount raised for missions and the wider work of the church.

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While the acquisition of more land will not interfere with the structure of the new section, it will encroach on the playing field and limit any future expansion. The committee reported that no progress had been attained in meeting with Mr. Post regarding part of his property, amounting to about five acres. There is about three acres in present school land. In view of this the following motion was passed:

Resolved that North Halton District High School Board requires the land described in Schedule A hereto, for the enlargement of the Georgetown High School site, and requires immediate possession thereof.

### Start Legal Proceedings

This motion, it was explained to the Board by the Georgetown representative, will start the necessary legal proceedings.

### Another motion aimed at getting building instituted road.

Resolved that all municipalities concerned with the North Halton High School District Board be approached to approve an eight room addition with suitable land to the Georgetown High School, the total cost to be approximately \$125,000.

The recent visit to the Department indicated it was reported that the government grant on this addition would meet with the department's approval.

### Injury to Student

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Mayor E. Tyler disclosed there are three sources, ranging up to over two miles outside of town, which could add substantially to the town's water supply. He did not locate these sources, but it was indicated piping would start at an open flow point.

Recalling last year's drilling efforts for more water, the Mayor said it had to be admitted only small, insufficient supplies could be gained by this expensive means.

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
