"Bronte subscribers will have numbers preceded by a distinguishing number," reported G. H. Harris, Bell manager for the area. "But all Oakville people will have to do to call Bronte friends will be to dial direct." There would be no calling "long distance," such as is the case now when wishing to talk to someone on the Clarkson exchange.

In other words, the Oakville phone range will be enlarged to take in Bronte unassisted by "central." However, adds Mr. Harris, long distance calls originating from the Bronte district likely would be made through Hamilton, whereas Oakville has its own long distance operators.

One of the undecided questions is where to put Bronte district's new dial system. Mr. Harris explains that the logical place is in the centre of development. "The big unanswered question is just where development will take place, and where its centre will be in years to come," he elaborated. He added the company was vitally interested in pending industrial development west of Bronte.

But while waiting for the dial, Bronte subscribers, with those of Oakville, Trafalgar, New Toronto and Port Credit, Cooksville, Streetsville, Clarkson and Mimico are eyeing the new Toronto Suburban-West directory.
