Points Affect Area

Credit Valley Authority Reports Recreation and Wildlife Survey

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority's full report on its recreation and wildlife studies, recently released in a proof edition, covers a comprehensive survey of existing natural facilities and potential development areas.

One of these, the Limehouse conservation area, was summarized in a recent article which appeared in this newspaper.

The detailed survey of all aspects of recreation and wildlife is prefaced by recommendations applying to these two sections. A previous report on forestry has already been filed with the Department of Planning and Development.

Recreation Recommendations:

The report on recreation lists four major recommendations. Many of these recommendations, if enacted upon, would affect this district, which is part of the extreme mid-western section of the Credit watershed. The recreation recommendations are:

That the people of the Credit Valley be advised by the Authority of the exceptional recreational potential of the Credit Forks area, and of the great possibilities for the future of this area;

That the Authority establish four multiple-use conservation areas as follows: Meadowvale - Churchville, 377 acres; Limehouse, 315 acres;

Terra Cotta, 500 acres; North Caldon, 550 acres.

That the Authority establish and publicize a scenic route of 62 miles running from Lake Ontario to Orangeville;

That the Authority make agreements with landowners to establish public footpaths linking the conservation areas.

Wildlife Recommendations:

Seven recommendations dealing with wildlife are stated as follows:

That the Authority urge the Department of Health to install a permit system for every new outlet (except agricultural tile drains) which leads into a watercourse;

That the Authority urge the Department of Health to set a time limit within which all municipalities, industries, gravel operators and home owners who now pollute a stream or streams must adequately treat their industrial or other wastes;

That the Authority carry out an extensive educational program concerning pollution;

That the Authority consider the possibility of acquiring, or at least leasing, the acquisition for the public of a stretch of river below the Credit Forks for public fishing;

That the Authority encourage farmers to construct or improve farm ponds for fish;

That the Authority sponsor a demonstration of improvements of a trout stream;

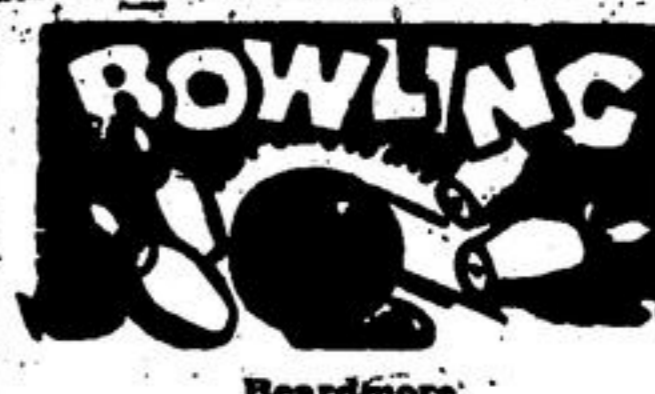
That the introduction of fish into the watershed be restricted to those parts of the river shown on the map "Biological Conditions of Streams" to be suitable for the species concerned.

Kilbride Streets Get 30 Mile Speed Limit

The speed limit on three of the main streets in Kilbride was set at 30 miles an hour in an action taken by Nelson council last week following a survey made by Township Engineer H. R. Peete. The motion, by Crs. Warren McIniven and Laron Laing, asked the road department to post "such signs as are necessary to enforce a 30-mile limit in the village." It also asked that the police department be informed and that "action be taken to strictly enforce this speed limit."

The engineer's report of a survey made last month was based on the Highway-Traffic Act which gives municipalities the power to establish a 30-mile speed limit in built-up areas.

League standing: Bulls Eyes 66, Robins 52, Hot Shots 43, Tumbling Teens 43, Orioles 42, Eagles 39.

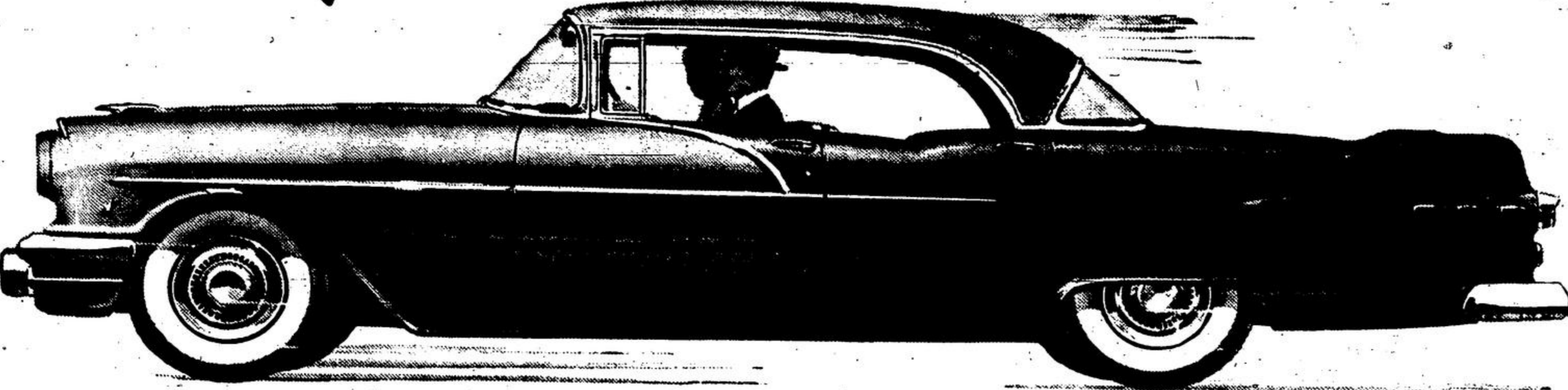

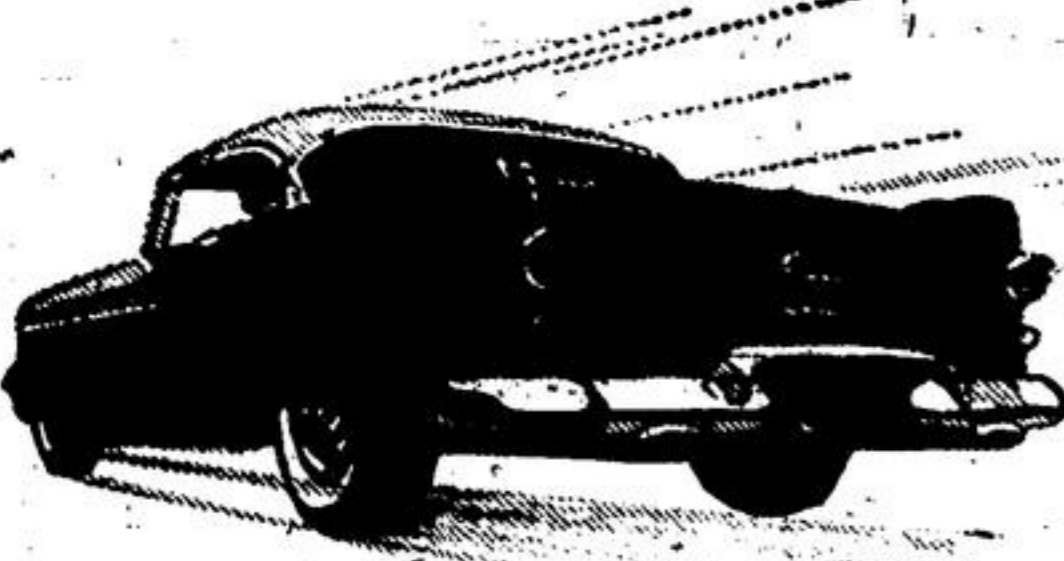
