Special Council Session

Esqueuing Agrees to H. S. Addition

A special meeting of Esqueuing township council was held recently to discuss a building proposal of the North Halton High School District Board. Members were all present and Reeve Linnham presided.

Council approved the high school building program recommended by the North Halton High School District Board for an addition to Georgetown high school, at an approximate cost of \$75,000. Council agreed to be liable for such portion of the principal and interest payable under debentures to be issued for the above expenditure as the equalized assessment of the township bears to the equal-

ized assessment of the whole North Halton High School district. At a regular meeting of Esqueuing council last week, a total of \$39 for foxes destroyed in Esqueuing was paid to Robert Elwood, Terra Cottis, John Chisholm, Acton; William Tuck, Georgetown; George Bayliss, Acton; E. D. Anderson, Acton.

Council is to request permission from the Department of Highways to advertise for tenders to purchase a new one ton truck.

A by-law empowering the reeve and clerk to sign an agreement with the Town of Acton regarding annexation compensation was passed.
