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Traf. Prepares Rabies Actions

Trafalgar council recently took steps in preparation for any rabies cases. The police department was requested to immediately advise the Medical Officer of Health of the owner of any dog which has bitten anyone, as well as the name of the person bitten.

Council approved the purchase of a traffic counter, to be bought at a price agreed upon by the Road Superintendent. Members also authorized the clerk to advertise for four sewer inspectors.

Township Hears Deputations, Set Road Bid

At a regular meeting of Esqueping township council last week, the following deputations were heard: Mr. Morris re proposed subdivision; the finance committee of Acton council along with Ed. T. Low, clerk and C. P. Leatherland re-annexation settlement; Mr. Brethaupt re opening of gravel tenders; Mr. Cooper re pensions for township employees.

The treasurer was instructed to pay the following accounts: Margaret Lawson, typing, \$13.; Georgetown Herald, account, \$66.; Halton Registry Office, February list, \$138.; R. J. Lovell and Co., returned tax sheets, \$38.50; a total of \$156.40 for inspectors under the Burdell's Control Act; a total of \$135 to the following for foxes destroyed: Frank Jones, Acton; George Bayliss, Acton; John Verlis, Norval; Clifford Stover, Milton; Wm. Sheppard, Acton; Linton Naylor, Milton; John Buck, Milton; Angelo Basso, Milton; M. Whitney, Milton; H. DeForest, Terra Cotta; A. Bridgen, Hornby.

Council voiced no objection to the removal by the Canadian National Railways of the fence separating their right of way from No. 7 highway in concessions 1 and 2 of the township, provided it does not interfere with private property owners.

The treasurer was instructed to pay the Grand Valley Conservation Authority the 1956 assessment of \$13.30.

Council accepted the tender of Holman Construction Ltd. to supply, crush and deliver approximately 15,000 yards of gravel on the roads of the township as per tender, under the supervision of the road superintendent. Work is to be completed by August 1, 1956. This is to be confirmed in a letter by Mr. Holman, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

The treasurer was asked to pay to G. C. Brown, Workmen's Compensation, clerical, \$17.50, counsellors \$15.; all others \$1.50; treasurer's bond \$75.

Road account, presented by the road superintendent, amounting to \$5,768.01, were ordered paid.
