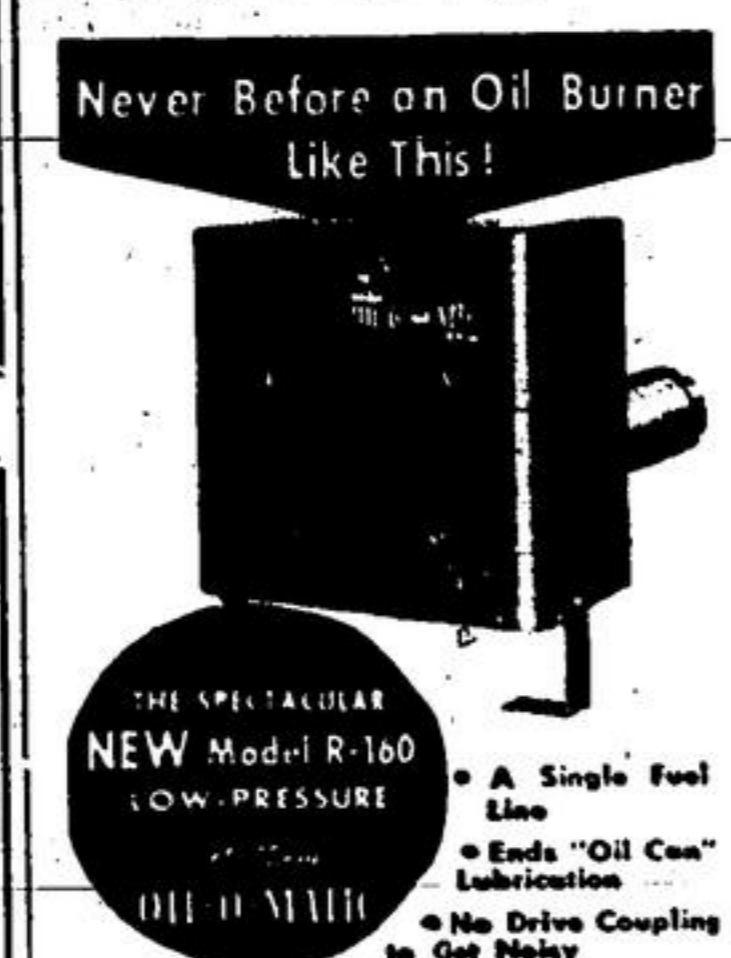

Position of Big Sports Limelight Is Criticized at Baseball Dinner

The annual banquet of the Athletic Association was held in the form of a banquet at Hawthorne Lodge, when the Intermediate C Ontario Baseball Champions for three years, and the Juvenile Ontario champions for one year, were entertained.

Leonard Andrews gave a record of the last year's work and films on sports were shown to entertain the boys and guests.

Frank Bill, the village barber, spoke on behalf of the little places. Lack of recognition in the metropolitan press of the little village of Campbellville's achievements in winning the Ontario Baseball Association Intermediate C championship for the third consecutive year was criticized.

The village barber says that special attention had to be taken of the advanced sections of our sports world and for this reason the small places like the village of Campbellville got overlooked altogether.

As an instance, this small community of Campbellville, comprising approximately 60 homes, two stores, one service station, a bank and the lowly barber shop has this year won its third consecutive O.E.B. A Intermediate C championship.

To his knowledge this is the only team to win this three times in a row 1953 from Bloomfield, 1954 from Corunna, 1955 from Sunderland. In addition, the Juvenile D team won its championship this year defeating Port Rowan.

The speaker urged hats off to Campbellville's two championship baseball teams and to Bloomfield, Corunna, Sunderland, and Port Rowan and all the "little places" all over the province, the breeding grounds of athletes and thriving hubs of sports and activity.

The village barber is quite correct when he suggests the little places are overlooked in the national interests that surround the activities of the big leagues in baseball, football, hockey, golf, curling, tennis, lacrosse, aquatic sports, or any other athletic pursuit you care to name. But that doesn't make the little places any less important. It's from the little places that many of our great professional athletes come.

Today the sport that receives the greatest coverage is major league baseball. The little places are very important, as the long list of centres participating in hockey, baseball and lacrosse in particular testify. They don't make the headlines very often but they and their athletes very much belong to the national sports scene.
