Onkville Councillor Fred Penton last week notified council he will introduce a motion at the next meeting to extend council members' term of office to two years, and also provide for "staggered" elections, in accordance with the Municipal Act. The town fathers also read a third and final time a by-law providing a \$500 a year stipend for each councillor.

"I think generally speaking there is a lot of support for extending the term of council to two years," he observed. "It certainly provides for continuity." He also suggested that the ward system be introduced.

"The whole election system, with regard to polling places, should be reviewed, so that election results can be obtained earlier," said Mayor Anderson.

Hints Town May Be First with New Equipment

The last bi-monthly meeting of the Acton Y's Men's Club was in the nature of an inter-club session with the Acton Rotary club. The Y's Men had a 100 per cent attendance of about 40 members. The joint meeting, the first of its kind, was the occasion of a talk-demonstration by the Bell Telephone Co. supervising engineer, Royden C. Henderson of Kitchener. His demonstration was called Things to Come.

A miniature micro-wave plant complete with towers was set up and Mr. Royden explained that already, where so far these towers have been erected, it is possible to carry unlimited number of telephone calls, radio and television programs, without wires, between stations. This effects a savings in operation, not to mention the absence of danger to the circuit by blizzards and ice storms.

Mr. Royden demonstrated the latest dial telephone instrument, developed by the Bell engineers. There were no movable parts, he pointed out. It is an advance over the most recent instrument that has four movable parts. The speaker hinted that Acton may well be the first place to have an exchange using the most modern up-to-date equipment. Several of the audience were permitted to call their homes using this latest type of telephone and equipment.
