

Spring in Nassagaweya

Superintendents Not Always Glum

Springtime is usually a happy time, but for a township road superintendent some springs can be anything but happy. Grumbles and complaints, criticism and worry—all can be the lot of a road superintendent if the winter has been particularly unkind to the rural roadways. It may not seem to matter to the ratepayers that the way of the weather, and what it can do to road surfaces and culverts, is quite out of the blameless road superintendent's hands.

spring and all. But according to one township road superintendent it isn't always, or doesn't have to be, that glum. Stanley Fulton, Nassagaweya's road caretaker for 25 years this spring has seen many springs in his job, some good, some bad and some indifferent. This spring, Mr. Fulton suggests, isn't too bad. To put the township's 85 miles or so of roads back into calmer shape, may cost Nassagaweya's taxpayers between \$300 to \$400. And this year, with a new \$16,000 grader to lighten and speed the work of the superintendent and his co-workers, Bill Wilson and George Thomas, that expense is well under the cost a "bad" spring could cause.



"Most of the work this year will be on the culverts, not so much on the actual road surfaces," he said. He went on to explain that spots washed away near bridges or shoulders sunken at the culvert edge often cause more time and effort to set right than the scarifying and smoothing of the surfaces. It's a job that takes time, he intimated, but a job that'll get done.
