Urge Merger of all South Peel Schools

Letters to Toronto township, Port Credit and Streetsville councils asked that a study of a merger of all school systems in southern Peel be made. The request was made by the South Peel Board of Education. The board feels that the suggested amalgamation of the school systems, particularly in the administration end, will result in the cutting of costs and maintaining of a more uniform educational standard.

Teaches Council To Save Money

Nelson councillors got a good idea about how to save the township money when authorizing employees or officials to attend a convention. Recently Harris Bell, road superintendent, was authorized to attend a conference on weeds held at the O.A.C., Guelph. His two and a half page typed report was read to council. Reeve Harold Adkins, terming it an excellent report, commented that perhaps some of us could take a lesson. Mr. Bell's report, after listing what had taken place, concluded: "I thank you for the opportunity to attend this weed control conference. I learned more than I could set down on many more sheets of paper than those used here. A lot of valuable data was obtained for very little cost, as my expenses were only 80 cents for my dinner. I took the township truck for transportation. Rest assured that I shall not fail to put into practice what I did learn."

WAR ON RATS

EDMONTON (CP) Alberta is still one of the few areas in the world relatively free from rats, the provincial agriculture department says. The rats have been confined to an 18-mile strip along the Saskatchewan border, except for a few colonies discovered west of the strip. About 240 pest control officers act as "spotters" throughout the province, controlling the pests.

May be Heat, Sprinkler System Installed in Brampton Arena

Quick action by Brampton council promises both heating and a sprinkler system for the Memorial arena. Council adopted its finance committee report which recommended as well that "Council request the arena commission to set the changeable rates as realistically as possible, it being understood that council recognizes it may have to subsidize the arena operations (if necessary) due to the community service aspect of the Memorial arena."

Recently John Bull headed a delegation to council to submit a brief. The brief asked what role the arena should play in future. It also recommended provision for a sprinkler system, which would reduce insurance costs by some \$1,900 annually and for heating, which would encourage greater attendance at events held in the arena.

The finance committee report endorsed both sprinkler and heating system, recommending that provisions be made for the issuing of debentures to cover. Lilias Trout pointed out that the saving accruing from reduced insurance costs would serve to pay for both systems.

Reg McKay, manager of the Consumers' Gas Co., informed councillors at a meeting of his company with Mr. Bull and recreation director Cliff Sutton discussed a heating system for the arena. It was felt Consumers' Gas could help with the cost of installation.

Deputy-reeve Fred Kline declared he was "happy as an ardent hockey fan about the heating. I feel the finance committee is going in the right direction." He hesitated about the debentures though and felt they could get enough sports-minded citizens to donate the cost if a drive were held. "Would you make the drive?" asked the mayor. "Yes, if I had the time," declared the deputy-reeve.

New councillor Walter Misener asked what would be the cost of the actual heating of the arena. Reeve Carman Core replied it would be in the neighborhood of \$4 or \$5 a

Institute New Planning Board

Georgetown Planning Board came into being last week when council made seven appointments to this new group which will have the job of advising council on a zoning plan. The board will examine a suggested plan by Town Planning Consultants presented to council several weeks ago, then submit their recommendations for council decision. Named to the board for three-year terms are Claude Kentner, coal and fuel oil merchant and Harold Bairstow, general manager of Detrex Developments. Edwin Wilson, Smith and Stone engineer and Bob McMenemy Jr., union leader at Smith and Stone, Mayor Jack Armstrong, deputy-reeve Doug Sargent and councillor Irwin Noble were appointed for one year terms.

In voting against Mr. Bairstow's appointment, C. LeRoy Dale said there is nothing personal in his belief that Mr. Bairstow should not be a planning board member. Mr. Dale said that as Mr. Bairstow has a direct interest in Detrex, whose plans may conflict with those of the rest of the town, it would be difficult to expect him to make impartial decisions.

Tops All Towns

Burlington topped all towns in Ontario in the March of Dimes campaign this spring, Mrs. J. Gordon Blair, chairman of the committee, has learned. The total contributions from the town and district amounted to \$4,968. Dundas and district, which was next, turned in \$2,300.

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
