

Peanut Queen To Have Trip, New Wardrobe

Crowning of Acton's second Peanut Day queen will again climax the Rotary club's fund-raising, Peanut Day. The first Saturday in June will see the culmination of several weeks' intensive selling of peanuts for votes—and for crippled children.

Proceeds of the club's annual Peanut Day go to the group's enterprises, of which aiding crippled children is the principal one.

Any Acton high school girl is eligible to be Queen and to win the thrilling trip to New York for a week. Votes are obtained with each purchase of peanuts. A week before the crowning of the Queen, numbers are reduced to the top-ranking 10. Final count is made the evening of Peanut Day with its peanut float and dancing peanut men.

New this year, adding even more excitement to the week in New York, will be a co-ordinated wardrobe from Acton's stores which the winner will take with her on the trip. It is expected this will be on display shortly.
