Scotch Farmer Enjoys Month's Stay in Halton

Halton Junior Farmers are at present entertaining a Scottish farmer named David Oag, in Canada for three months to study Canadian farming. Mr. Oag, who comes from Ailness in Northern Scotland, has visited in Oxford county, and while visiting in Halton, has been staying with John Pickett and Mr. and Mrs. Stuart McFadden.
 Mr. Oag is 26 years old and celebrated his birthday at the Pickett home on Friday. He has noted considerable differences between the farming in Scotland and Canada. He is one of four Scottish young farmers in Canada for the three months' stay. The other three are Robert Howie in Lincoln county, Allstair Grant in Grey county, and Mary Adams in Wentworth county.
 Mr. Oag and his three companions left Scotland in April and plan to return in June. He will stay in Halton from May 1 to 10, then spend four days at the O.A.C. in Guelph and at Niagara Falls. Following this, he will visit York county.
 He is vice-president of the Scottish Young Farmers' group in Ross-Shire county, Scotland. Reviewing his farm in Scotland, he noted it has 45 milking cows and 110 others of all ages, as well as 100 breeding ewes. His farm at home, while being primarily a dairy farm, is verging on mixed farming, for he has 30 acres of turnips and 30 of potatoes. No silage is grown.
 Needless to say the young man is enjoying his stay in Halton county, as was indicated as he made his way through an ice cream sundae in a restaurant while interviewed by this paper.
