With Mrs. Miller, the deceased resided in Acton for the past seven years, having been an active church worker and an elder of Acton United church during his residence here.

Funeral service was held on Friday, May 4, at the Ramsey Funeral Home, conducted by Rev. E. A. Currey of London, Ont., assisted by Rev. G. Adams, Acton. I.O.D.E. Provincial President Seeks More "Flag Waving," Patriotism

At their May meetings, both the Duke of Devonshire chapter and the Lakeside chapter, of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire heard reports from their delegates on the 36th annual meeting of the Provincial Chapter of Ontario, held in the Royal Connaught Hotel, Hamilton on April 18 to 20.

"Canada is not a demonstrative nation. There is far too little flag-waving," the provincial president, Miss Jeanne Knapman, told members there. She pointed out the first objective of the Order was to stimulate and give expression to the sentiment of patriotism, and that, as the largest patriotic organization in the country, it was the duty of the I.O.D.E. to encourage the use of the flag on all suitable occasions.

She warned her listeners that if Canada is to be a strong, united nation, the members of this generation would have to be taught the true meaning of the freedoms they enjoy.

Referring to communists, Miss Knapman declared, "as members of the I.O.D.E. you should be alert and well-informed on such organizations."

Many had received assistance. The provincial treasurer, Mrs. D. A. Bruce, reported to the ladies that the combined efforts of provincial chapters has resulted in a total disbursement of \$370,700.

Field of Endeavor: Each chapter has its own field of endeavor, the delegates learned. There is a task for every member, not just the officers.

How to keep members interested and how to have regular attendance were discussed.

There is a real need to adopt schools and to help isolated rural areas, one secretary pointed out. "The boys and girls of Canada are our greatest asset."

There were suggestions for pot luck suppers, garden parties and citizenship teas. Help to New Canadians was stressed.

Mrs. Brook, Empire and World Affairs secretary who has addressed chapters locally, said members should be given a good understanding of this cornerstone of the order. Another district visitor, Mrs. Leckie, suggested New Canadians should wear their national costumes at fall fairs.

It was stressed that I.O.D.E. money was needed for I.O.D.E. and Joken contributions should be given in the community.

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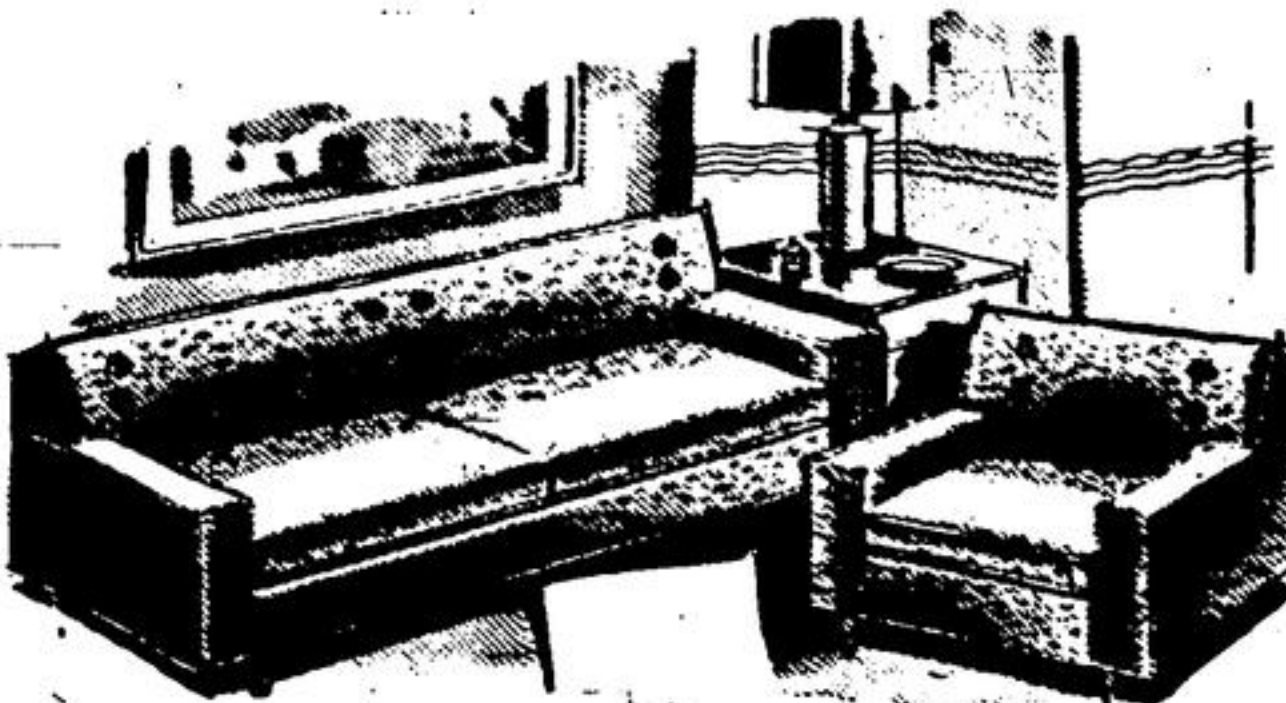
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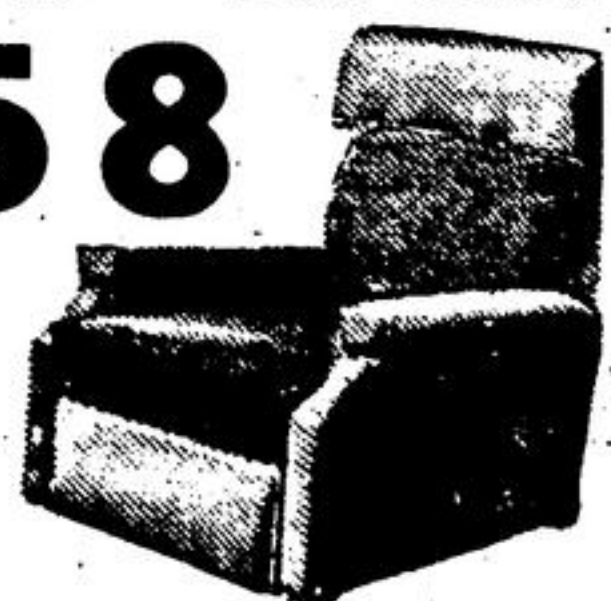


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GALA DAY - MAY 21st

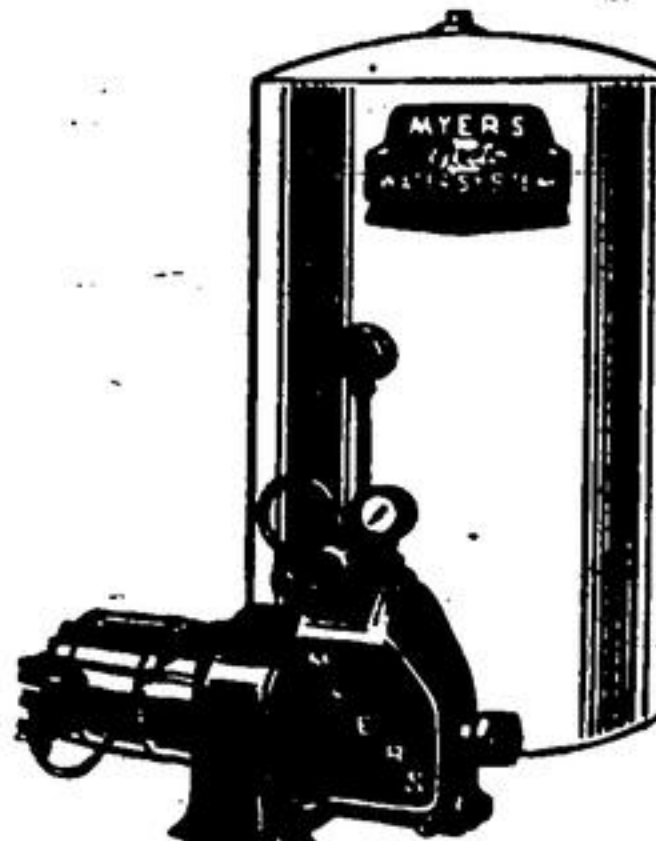
Worthwhile prizes will be awarded to many of the entertainers and this should be an enjoyable day for young and old.
