Are Women, Children Seven out of ten of all fire fatalities this year will be women and children, according to the All Canada Insurance Federation

Officials of the Federation, which represents more than 200 fire, automobile and casualty insurance companies, said that fire accounted for 500 deaths each year in Canada. Warning that most fires are caused by carelessness, they said that 20 children died in fires last year because they were left unattended by parents.

According to insurance statistics, 1,300 fires occur in Canada each week-more than 80 per cent of them residential fires. Annual cost for all fires is close to \$100,000,000.
