Not Sufficient Polio Vaccine

There is not a sufficient supply of poliomyelitis vaccine at the present time to give the third dose to those children who had two doses last year, according to Dr. A. F. Bull of the Halton County Health Unit in Milton.

In this second stage of the immunization program this year, during the three weeks beginning June 4, the Health Unit is planning to give the second dose to those children who had one dose approximately a month or so ago.

"It is uncertain when an adequate supply of vaccine will be available," said Dr. Bull, "but it will probably be before the end of June."

Children who have had only one dose of polio vaccine should receive their second dose now. Children who have already had two doses will not be receiving their third dose at the present time.

It is unfortunate that the supply of vaccine has not been as great as we had expected, but it is felt that children who have had two doses will have adequate protection for this year," said the doctor.

Dr. Bull also added a word of appreciation for the co-operation and assistance which has been given by everyone connected with this immunization program.
