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Contest, Reports, Talks Highlight W.I. Annual at Eden Mills

Eden Mills Presbyterian church was host to the members of South Wellington Institutes for their annual meeting. Mrs. Roy, president of Eden Mills branch, welcomed the delegates, and in reply Mrs. E. Rowan of Eramosa branch invited this group to be their guests for next year's meeting.

The branch secretaries' reports showed that many interesting and varied activities had been carried out through the year. Some of these included local projects such as exhibits at fall fairs, gifts sent to sick and shut-ins, bank books given to new babies, sponsoring 4-H clubs, gifts to grade eight school pupils, installation of swings and kitchen equipment in schools. Many branches reported having sent their secretary to the officers' conference and of sending delegates to the district annual and area convention.

There were also several that had given financial assistance for sending the five delegates from Ontario to the Associated Country Women of the World conference, to be held in Ceylon this year as well as making a further contribution to the South Wellington Scholarship fund. Some of the demonstrations given included making chocolates, making artificial flowers, Christmas decorations, floral arrangements and aluminum tray etching.

Mrs. R. D. Hendry, Gall, F.W.I.O. board member for this subdivision, conducted the ratification of the district directors.

Miss Flora Durain, representing the Home Economics Service, Extension Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, brought greetings from the director, Miss Helen McKecher, and outlined the services available.

She suggested that consideration be given to having local leaders for some of the courses. This system has proved quite successful in some other countries. Study kits are available for home use on some subjects. Miss Durain asked that Women's Institute members let their wishes be known to Miss McKecher.

Mrs. Murray McKenzie, reporting for the scholarship committee, was pleased to say that the scholarship fund was now completed and it is hoped will soon be functioning. Miss Flora Durain, County Home Economist, has great praise for the local leaders in the 4-H clubs. The number of girls taking club projects has increased greatly in the last two years from 220 in 1954 to 387 registered in 1956, she said.

Mrs. Murray McKenzie of Eramosa branch is to be honored with the presentation of a Department of Agriculture certificate in recognition of five consecutive years as club leader. Next season's club will be "Meat in the Menu" to be followed by "The Supper Club."

Mrs. T. Hilton, club leader from Utopia branch, commented on the exhibit on display from the club, "Being well dressed and well groomed," and explained some of the points studied in that unit.

Considerable interest was shown in the three competitions, history, painting and handicraft. Prizes for the Tweedsmuir history book were awarded to Eden Crest and Eramosa, and for the painting to Mrs. Osborne of Utopia and Mrs. Gordon of Puslinch. Judges for these two competitions were Miss Nellie Stickney of Fergus and Mr. Gordon Couling of Guelph. Mrs. R. M. Starkey and Mrs. N. J. Thomas judged the handicraft competition which included ten articles suitable for a hope chest. West End, Riverside and Eramosa were the winners in this section.

The fact that the Women's Institute is not a money-making organization was again stressed by the president, Mrs. Roy McCartney. Mrs. McCartney urged the members to study the hand book, to read the "Federated News", and to educate themselves in matters of their own organization.

Pick-Up Truck, Bus Collide; Two Hurt
