sewer property only, in the face of this, some councillors contended the company is unlikely to agree to buy the blocking house.

When the motion was put to complete expropriation proceedings on the Brankiewicz property, Mayor Tyler asked for a recorded vote. It resulted as follows: Aye—Barbeau, Hargrave, Tyler, Wilson; Nay—Lindsay, Foothill, Brown, Brunelle, Cook. The motion lost.

Council authorized payment of \$700 for the two recently-purchased used garbage trucks, also ordered an account with A. Kirkness of \$18 for mileage paid and an account with Mansell Nellis for \$2140 paid. Another bill from Mr. Nellis was held back pending clarification of some items on the account charged to the town.

Regarding the recent discussion of a new health and accident group plan for municipal employees, Mayor Tyler reported some P.U.C. salaried employees were not in favor of a change from their present plan. The Finance Committee was asked to determine in writing which employees favored the plan and which did not.

**Property Changed Hands**

Work to remove earth from around the fence of private property at Churchhill Road and No. 7 highway has not been completed, councillor Brown reported. It was noted that this property has recently changed hands and the new owners, an oil company, do not wish any earth removed.

J. McMullen was granted permission to build a house, according to a plan submitted on a property which contains a town-hall easement provided no part of the building is within seven feet of the pipe line and the builder is responsible for any damage to the easement.

A letter from the Commissioner of Police informed the town it would have to pay for the salary of a replacement to the local force during annual vacation periods.

After clerk J. MacGeehan quoted submitted prices on calcium, a brief exchange occurred between councillors W. Cook and R. N. Brown. The former questioned why there had been no meeting of the road committee called by councillor Brown to discuss the calcium prices and other matters. This produced a general talk on committee functions and matter of meetings. The net result was a suggestion by the Mayor that this matter, with others pending, be considered in road committee as soon as possible.

**On New Business**

Council heard the regular magistrate's summary and police report, granted the Duke of Devonshire IODE chapter permission to hold a tag day on fall fair dates; acknowledged notice of a change in patrol times by the dog control truck of the Huron County; turned over to the North Halton Urban Board a request by the Humane Society for a tag day in this neighborhood; approved appointment of E. E. Barr to replace M. Holmes on the local Planning Board.

After minutes of the last Urban Board meeting were read, council unanimously passed a motion to consent to issuance of an interim order fixing gas rates to October 1, 1956 as in the schedule submitted by the United Suburban Gas Co. Ltd.

A petition brought by R. N. Brown was submitted requesting installation of water and sewer lines north on the Third Line. This petition held four names. It was pointed out there were 12 home owners who would be affected.

In connection with the petition a 16-lot plan of subdivision, submitted by Mr. Brown earlier this year to the Planning Board, was opened for council after the Department of Planning and Development sought assurances services would be available to the area.

Councillor Lindsay recalled a motion last year that construction of no further subdivisions be allowed in Acton. He also said the petition didn't have the required 75 per cent majority.

This started a brief discussion as council viewed the economic aspects of eventually serving north on the third line. Mayor Tyler pointed out plans to enlarge the town's water resources and system should be considered in this proposed third line development. Council agreed the whole matter was put in abeyance.

Council was informed a railway grant of 30 per cent on gross cost had been approved for the Maria St. bridge, leaving the town about \$10,000 to pay. The Department of Highways confirmed grants for 1956 roads expenses on a maximum of \$25,000.

A by-law for construction of a new fire hall was read a first time and will go to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.

**Cut of Top Soil Sale**

Sale by the town of top soil came in for some criticism after the clerk suggested the asking price of \$4 per load was not enough. Most members agreed the town now needs all the top soil, taken from new road allowances, it has, particularly for proposed new park areas. It was agreed to cut off sales of top soil.

Council got into a long talk-fest over lack of progress in sewer installations at Lakeview. Deputy-revee Wilson wondered why there had been no committee meetings to learn all the facts of the trouble there. A foreman's report was produced and extracts read. Questions were left hanging about the engineer's rulings on grades.

The whole council got involved in a review of information that would normally be handled by committee. The Mayor urged a meeting of this committee, the

It was Milton's "Mohawk" pack, under Douglas Hill, that swept the competition, winning 72 points—30 more than the nearest runner-up, Acton B pack with 42 points, and Acton A pack with 40 points. Erin pack ran next with 34 points, tied with Milton "Troquois". Georgetown A pack followed with 14 points and Georgetown C pack with six points.

Before the contest events, featured by field signalling and knotting competition, the cubs formed a parade behind Acton Citizens' Band at the C.N.R. station. From there they marched through town while local Boy Scouts handled traffic flow until the park was reached.

Field Commissioner Ron Robertson, Hamilton, led the parade.

At the park a huge circle was formed and the grand howl was led by Sixer Brian Barbeau of Acton. Commissioner Robertson led in the cub prayer and the flag was broken by Bill Greenfield of Milton to complete the preliminary ceremonies.
