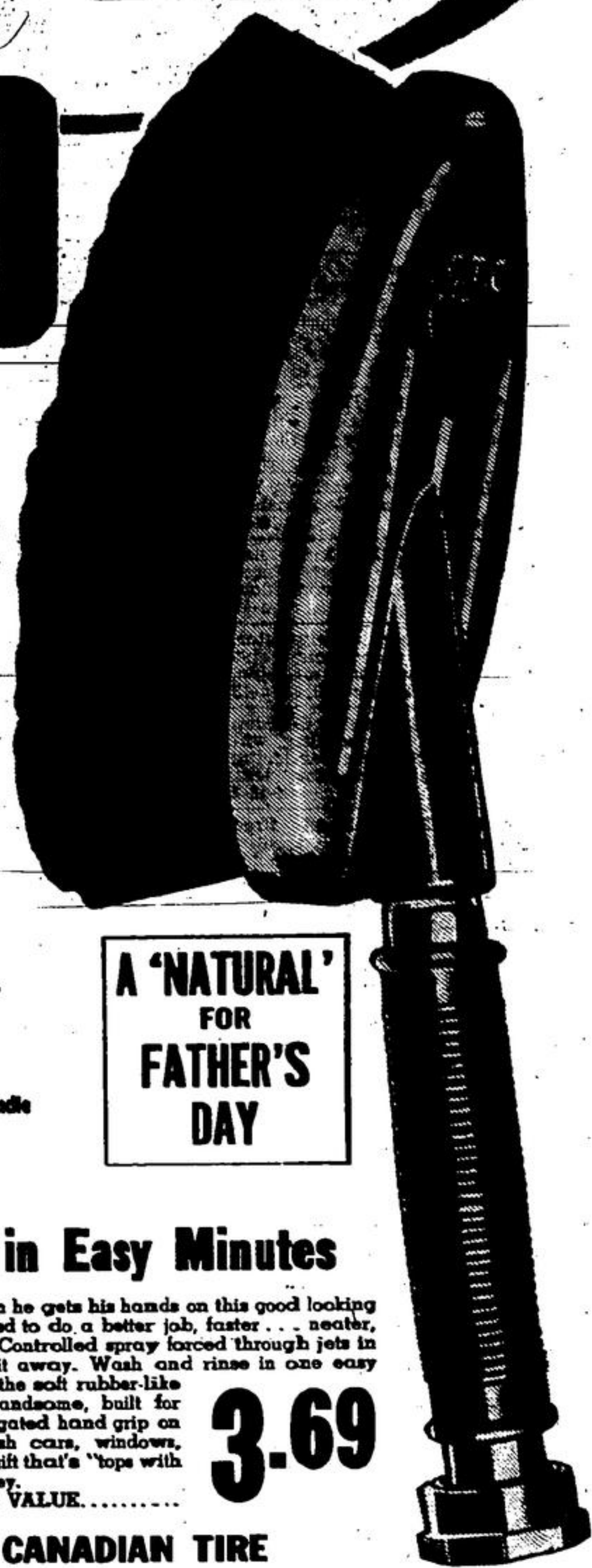

To finish the day, parting gifts were presented to the three teachers who are leaving the aforementioned two and Mr. Pasty, who has been with us in two years.
