

### New Six-Classroom Public School Likely to Be Started This Summer

Mr. Elmore said houses were being changed to allow for drainage, also in future a new type of house, with no basement, was being built and this would eliminate the problem for these homes.

Engineer Frank Palsen also spoke, declaring grade was lost in the subdivision when under the original plan, required depth for the trunk could not be reached on Main St.

**Cost of Rough Grading**  
Another problem raised by the subdivider dealt with cost of rough grading roads. On 28 homes built or occupied, and on another 60 in progress, the contractor contended there has been no provision in cost to allow for increased expense in rough grading roads. He also pointed out C.M.H.C. has held up loans on 28 houses because of lack of a completed entrance from Main St.

For future rough grading, the contractor indicated the company was willing to pay \$50 or \$60 per lot if the town requires, and this is indicated to C.M.H.C., so loans can be released.

The whole subject is to be further dealt with in committee where estimates are to be studied for further rough grading costs.

Engineer Palsen broached the question of a creek which runs through the subdivision. A. Duby urged an early decision on what is to be done to control the creek since it is holding up water line installations. The engineer is to further discuss it with the subdivider.

Another problem, the one again reared up: the 'Brankiewicz case'.

**Would Deal Directly**  
Robert Hudson Construction informed the town by letter that it would donate \$2,000 toward expropriation and other costs. Total contributions by the builder to date have been \$3,483 in the tortuous process of putting a road, straight or crooked, into Lakeview from Main St.

Legal counsel for Mr. Brankiewicz asked if the council would be willing to permit him and his client to deal directly with the subdivider in efforts to reach an agreement on damages suffered and amount of compensation that may be paid.

It was pointed out the town has made repeated efforts to clear the way for a straight road but it has proven impossible to do so on a reasonable basis.

**Call Recorded Vote**

A recorded vote was called for on a motion that expropriation proceedings be carried out on the Brankiewicz property. This would have the solicitor file a cheque in court for payment of the property required. The motion carried as follows: Aye, Barbeau, Hargrave, Lindsay, Brunelle, Wilson, Nav, Cook, Footitt and Brown.

An unfavorable report on Acton park's grandstand was heard from the insurance company. The grandstand was reported not sturdy and would easily topple under a sudden shift of weight. It was recommended the stand be torn down and rebuilt in view of this serious concern over the liability position of the town.

Fair board chairman Barbeau also indicated his board felt the stand should be torn down and noted the long-range plans of the Board included a new stand.

Clerk McGeechie recalled the Fair Board had objected two years ago to talk of taking the stand down and at the time had agreed to fix it up. Councillor S. Brunelle wondered if it would be possible to fix the stand temporarily at a minimum cost.

**Plans are Long Range**

Councillor Barbeau said the Parks Board plans were tentative and in long range. It is hoped, he said, to get the assistance of various organizations in town to help with the project. He suggested some \$4,200 might be available locally for this and to improve the changing enclosures near the swimming area.

Council agreed to have the grandstand torn down since it has been declared unsafe by the insurance company.

Mayor Tyler added that the board believed there was need for a phone booth in the grounds. A pay phone is to be installed inside the park gates.

An indigent account for \$228.75 was passed, also two relief applications were discussed.

Flooding at the Mill-Young St. curve was reported. The road committee was delegated to review the situation.

Council filed the report of the county high school consultative committee, also filed the Halton equalization assessment by-law and authorized issuance of a cheque for \$16,912.25 for the county levy when funds are available.

**Hearing on Water**

Council was reminded of a public hearing by the Ontario Water Resources Commission in Brampton July 10 when reports and briefs on water supply, pollution and needs in the Credit Valley Conservation Authority will be heard. The town was asked for a brief on the local situation.

Council deemed the meeting important enough to move the next regular council session back a day in order that the town might be represented. A paper on Acton's water position is to be prepared. A by-law to cover a Mill St. property sale in 1919 by the now defunct village housing commission was passed after it was found in a title search that the legality had been completed. The formality by-law, late but necessary, officially authorized the sale.

Several catch basin covers were reported by Councillor Lindsay in need of attention. This was turned over to the road committee. A complaint about a Mill St. fence, cut off and leaving angle

irons protruding, was heard and termed a hazard. A letter is to be sent in efforts to eliminate this danger.

Councillor Barbeau reported holes in the race track at the park are to be filled up and calcium chloride applied.

Commendation was voiced for Peel Street residents working together to lay sidewalk in front of their homes.

Toward midnight, another attempt was made to find a solution to the chronic problem of council's lengthening meetings.

A motion was defeated that delegations be limited to five minutes and one spokesman and that interjections from the gallery be disallowed with the purpose of the delegation submitted in advance to council.

Deputy-reeve Wilson said delegations can't be limited to a specific time since some take longer than others.

"The idea is very nice but it's a tendency to dictatorship," Councillor Cook observed.

**Interjections Objectionable**

The interjections are the objectionable part, Councillor Barbeau said, often with two or three people speaking at once on the same subject.

Councillor Cook added that if a citizen is sitting at council and has a point to raise he should be allowed to speak when permission is asked.

Councillor Lindsay said that privilege is not allowed at city councils.

A citizen can stand on his feet any place and have his say, Councillor Cook insisted.

"For two hours tonight we've had nothing but interjections," Councillor Lindsay asserted.

Deputy-reeve Wilson stated a councillor should have the floor and be able to speak without interruptions.

Mayor Tyler asked if council members would agree, as the rules of procedure state, to speak once on any one subject and say no more.

**Another Vote Loses**

This event unseated as members briefly discussed the action of Milton council in limiting delegations for one hour on specified meeting dates.

Councillor Cook said he didn't think the Ratepayers' Association representatives had prolonged any meetings.

"This has nothing to do with the motion, we're just wasting more time," Councillor Barbeau said.

Deputy-reeve Wilson suggested it be up to the mayor to signify the end of discussion on a subject when the points have been made. To this the mayor replied that there had been a charge earlier of dictatorship which, if this suggestion were followed, could be levelled at him.

"We'll have to be more strict about ending discussion," the deputy-reeve said.

Another motion was tabled, that delegations be limited to a one-hour period and notice of their intention be submitted to the clerk in advance, then delegates heard in order of appearance. This motion passed.
