Campbellville League-Leaders Beat Brampton 16-1 Acton 17-6

Campbellville trounced Brampton 16-1 on Saturday as Jack Roberts chalked up his fourth win of the season. Roberts gave up just four hits as he walked one, hit one batter and struck out 12. Brampton tried unsuccessfully to stop the league-leaders with left handers Bud Fuller and Burgie, but both port-riders were knocked out before the end of the fourth and the right hander Bronziewski finished up. The three hurlers gave up 11 hits, 10 walks, hit three batters and struck out six.

Haynes, B. Merritt, and Bronziewski singled for Brampton and T. Merritt tripled. Allan Wingrove again led the Campbellville attack with a double and two singles, Jack Cairns had two singles, and Henderson, Laking, Earl Cairns, Bill Cairns, Dredge and Moore all hit safely one.

18 hits ran off the league-leaders' bats for 37 bases, including five home runs. Southpaw Harry Lawson started for Acton but lasted only one inning as he was touched for six runs. He was succeeded by Scott and Cunningham in that order. They gave up a total of 12 off 18 hits. They walked two and failed to strike out a single batter.

Harry Hamilton started for Campbellville but was taken out with none out in the third and six runs in. Hamilton only allowed two hits but was the victim of weak support and poor control. Stan Henderson was brilliant in relief as he worked seven scoreless innings, giving up two hits one walk and he struck out eight.
