Each club member was requested to exhibit her book of records as well as her whole wheat or graham muffins she had made. They answered a quiz on cereals and each got a chance to judge a class of muffins and a class of cereals.

Each club was requested to either erect an exhibit and give a commentary, or give a team demonstration or skit on cereals. Four clubs chose to erect an exhibit, the others to give a skit.

At the close of the afternoon, certificates, pins and spoons were awarded for completion of homemaking units. Mrs. Borgstrom made the presentations. Ruth Wilson of the Norval club and Glenna Rose of the Nelson club were awarded certificates for completing 12 homemaking units, and Pat Hamilton of Hornby and Shirley Brennan of Ashgrove received awards for completing six units.
