Brampton Keeps Dental Service

Brampton Public School Board has taken a step forward towards a permanent solution to what in some quarters has been made a contentious problem—the provision of dental services in schools of the town.

By the board decision, kindergarten pupils and those of grades one and two only will be treated as before.

Pupils of other grades will receive the same examination and notification as is provided in other schools of the county.
