only solution is a program of permanent-type roads.
There will be no open season for the hunting of deer in Halton this year, council decided after the re-formation committee tabled the recommendation. Questioned by Reeve Hargrave as to why the committee was opposed to an open season, Reeve A. R. Service explained a great number of deer were disposed of during the hunt last year. It was felt another open season should not be permitted for another three or four years.
Appoint G. G. Brown
A by-law was given three readings appointing Garfield G. Brown as assistant clerk-treasurer at a starting salary of \$4,200. His duties will commence September 1.
Council established a policy of sending delegates to the Canadian Good Roads Convention. Delegates attended last year's convention and it was decided to appropriate a maximum of \$1,000 for this purpose. A year ago the convention was held at Calgary, and it is being held in Quebec this year. Another year it may be held closer to home, as it was explained by chairman of the road committee Reeve Marshall.
A new gavel is to be presented to each Ward after his appointment. It was decided. The question arose when it was mentioned it would be a good practice for the retiring wardens to have the gavel as a memento of his holding office. One will be given to Reeve Shannon who served in 1955, and is still a member of council.
