While a vote of the ratepayers has been promised before any township hall is started, the Utilities Commission is under no such obligations, and is held up only by lack of architects' plans.

Industrial permits totalling \$307,720 were issued by Trafalgar Township Building Inspector Angus Greig's department during July. Included were a construction shop for Tank Car Products, 3rd Line, \$100,000; factory and office building, Canadian Charts and Supplies, Eighth Line and Queen Elizabeth Highway, \$92,720; addition to Canadian General Electric factory, Queen Elizabeth Highway, \$55,000.

A permit was issued for St. James Separate School, Morden Road, \$120,000, and one for a radio transmitter, building at the Queen Elizabeth Highway and the Fourth Line for Oakville's new radio station, at \$1,000.

The township's assessment is now just under the \$10,000,000 mark. It was about \$17,500,000 at the first of this year.
