Trafalgar Public Utilities Commissioners are awaiting suggestions and sketches from their architect, and Manager Harvey Philip said, We hope to get started on a new building this year," at the new site on the Seventh Line midway hetween the Queen Elizabeth Way and the Dundas Highway.
