



Flames Destroy Palermo Barns

Loss is \$40,000

A large barn, two storey hen house, driving shed, implement shed and garage were destroyed by fire Saturday, July 29, when fire of undetermined origin broke out in the hay mow of the barn of John Vansickle Palermo.

Damage is estimated at \$40,000. Mr. Vansickle who was just finishing milking his herd of purebred Holsteins discovered the fire at 7:30. A mow was aflame near a sheep pen at one end of the building when he first spotted the fire. There were 12 or 15 bales of hay left over from last year in the sheep pen and before aid could be summoned the blaze was out of control.

Trafalgar Fire Department dispatched three fire trucks to the scene. There was a reservoir in the barn but the searing heat of the flames prevented firemen from making use of it.

Similarly, a pond in a field at the rear of the barn was useless as there was not sufficient length of hose to reach it.

As the flames roared through the barn and leaped to a nearby drive barn and machinery shed, the adjacent house was threatened for a time.

Take Out Furniture

Firemen, aided by police and volunteers began emptying the house of furniture and valuables but a sudden shift in the wind changed the direction of the flames and embers, and firemen using the house reservoir as a water supply were able to prevent damage to the house.

Sometime during the evening, someone is believed to have taken a power lawn mower from the lawn when the fire was at its peak and a large crowd had been attracted by the flames. The lawn mower was on the front lawn when the fire started and during the evening, the Vansickle's daughter-in-law, Betty Vansickle, moved the machine against a tree so it would be out of the way. In the morning it was gone.

Two small calves and about 60 hens were burned to death in the fire. Mr. Vansickle was able to get his herd of 15 milk cows out of the burning barn safely.

The buildings were insured. As well as the buildings themselves, a quantity of machinery and tools were destroyed in the fire.
