District Governor Addresses Rotarians

Walter De Geer, governor of District 246 of Rotary International, paid his annual official visit to Acton last week. He spoke at the local club's weekly supper meeting at the Dominion Hotel.

There are 41 Rotary clubs in Central Ontario, in the district of which Mr. DeGeer is governor. During his year of office, he will visit each club. Manager of a lumber company in Bowmanville, Mr. DeGeer is a member and past president of the Rotary club of Bowmanville. He has served as president of the Bowmanville Chamber of Commerce, is a member of Bowmanville town council and has also served as a director of the Ontario retail lumber dealers' association.

At Rotary's 47th annual convention in Philadelphia last year, he was elected district governor - one of 248 district governors supervising the activities of 12,000, 9,100 Rotary clubs which have a membership of 431,000 business and professional executives in 99 countries.

Wherever Rotary clubs are found in the world, their activities are similar to those of Acton's club because they are based on the same general objectives - developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men; promoting community betterment; raising the standards of business and professions; and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

During the past year 351 new Rotary clubs were organized in seven new countries - Angola, Iran, Guinea, Jordan, Netherlands, New Guinea, Ruanda-Urundi and Swaziland. Attractive new green-painted benches and tables are being made by the club for the Parks Commission. Three of the total group of six have been taken to the park and are already in use.

Tweedsmuir History Winners Announced Monday, August 20

Judging of the Tweedsmuir history books for the 1956 Provincial competition was completed last Friday in Toronto at the Department of Agriculture. The winner will be announced, it is expected, at a tea to be held on August 20. The provincial president, Mrs. Gordon MacPhatter, will make the announcement.

The first Tweedsmuir History Provincial competition was held in Guelph in 1947 when hundreds of books were entered. The competitions are held every two years.

There were 56 books entered in the competition this year, among them several from this district. Mrs. Robert Walker, St. George, Ontario, convener for historical research and current events, F.W.L.O., praised the quality of the Tweedsmuir books and the amount of time and effort that has gone into the making of them.

"It is up to the district conveners of historical research and current events to see that each and every branch has their own Tweedsmuir History," Mrs. Walker said. "That is the goal we are aiming for, that will really preserve our history."

In making the awards, there will be a first and second prize and 10 honorary mentions. There were three judges and the books were scored for general appearance and organization, instruction and information, historical data and current events.

The first three prize winners in the provincial competition will be eligible for the Dominion competition to be held in 1957 in Ottawa.
